Program Chair **David McWhorter** delivered the introduction for speaker **Bob May**.

Bob May is an author and speaker. He has always been passionate about baseball and baseball board game simulation. When he was 7 years old (summer of 1949), his Dad took him to his first base-

ball game at Fenway Park in Boston to see the New York Yankees play the Boston Red Sox. He has been a baseball fan ever since.

He has lived in Rockwall since 2000 with his English wife, **Michele**. They just celebrated their 48^{th} anniversary last week. <applause> They have three children and eight grandkids. Bob is a substitute teacher in Rockwall ISD.

His topic today is *Honoring Twenty-One Forgotten Baseball Players from the Black Ball Era* (Negro Leagues or segregated baseball). In July 2012, he published his first book, *The Best Season—The First 90 Games*, honoring Black Ball through baseball game simulation. This is the first book in a two-book series. The second book, *The Best Season—The Challenging Finish*, is planned for a 2016 release.

When the projector was fired up, it displayed Bob's computer's desktop but not the running PowerPoint®. Sainted Coffor, who had set it up, rushed to the laptop to cycle through the many external screen setups, finding the right one on the second try. This didn't prevent him from crowing on the first try.

While tech support was fumbling, **FLASH** rose to relate a story about a man his age who showed up with arm candy half his age. **FLASH** queried him about his new wife to discover that he had lied about his age. He had claimed to be in his 90s.

By this time, Bob had found his presentation and begun, telling us that he "bawled my eyes out" at the movie Field of Dreams. What gets him every time is the scene where the **Kevin Costner** character asks his resurrected Father for a game of catch. It was such a game that cemented Bob's relationship with his own Father.

Bob admitted that writing his book had been "my Field of Dreams." In it, he wondered what would have happened if **Satchel Paige** faced off against **Stan Musial**.



He asked us what was special about 1941. More specifically what was significant about 1941 for **Joe DiMaggio**, and before we could warp time, Bob said it's not his marriage to **Marilyn Monroe** (1954). Someone suggested he'd had a 50 game hitting streak, and Bob corrected that to 56. **Ted Williams** batted .406 in 1941. The same year **Hilton Smith** had a 10-0 league record with the *Kansas City Monarchs*.



Hilton Smith was in the Negro League. He was born in Giddings, TX, about a third of the way from Austin to Houston. He was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame posthumously. His stats were amazing, leading Bob

to wonder how he and others in Black Ball would fare against modern players.



Bob lived and breathed baseball since 1949. He was in Little League but posted 0-34 and decided he wouldn't "be replacing Ted Williams" any time soon. His brother, Warren, was the better player. "Donna,

across the street, was better than both of us."

So he played fantasy baseball with the APBA Baseball Card Game. He "loved the statistical side of baseball." And he would "broadcast" games from his room; "It's a high fly ball to deep left field..." causing his family to wonder, "What's wrong with Bobby."

He played *Strat-O-Matic* baseball in good company with **George W. Bush**. In 1987, it was state of the art: the most realistic fantasy baseball because the stats depended not only upon the players but also the fields.

Bob said he asked the memory of Satchel Paige how he would like to be memorialized, and got the answer that he wants 165 games with the best of all time. Ted Williams once remarked, "I've been a very lucky guy to have worn a baseball uniform, and I hope some day the names of Satchel Paige and Josh Gibson in some way can be added as a symbol of the great Negro players who are not here only because they weren't given a chance."

Another player of that era was "Cool Papa" **Bell** of whom it was said that he was so fast that he could "hit the switch and be in bed before the light went out." He would regularly make it from 1st to 3rd on a bunt, and one time he made it all the way home.

He told us of **Oscar Charleston** who he considers in the company of **Babe Ruth** and **Willie Mays**. Locally, **William Blair**, **Jr**., died in Dallas just last Easter. Bob's convinced that God is using his passion for baseball to correct an injustice.

Earnest offered him "what all speakers covet, the Plano Rotary" and the Club finished in unison, "perpetual calendar."


