John Caldwell captured today's photographs, including a selfie, receiving a 5-year Rotary Service Pin. Back from the LAND OF THE WINTER

DLYMPICS, Prince Porné opened the festivities at 12:11, summoning Blair Ritchey for the Invocation followed by Kelly Palmer with the Pledge. Rick fêted himself for Greeting and called SERGEANT KRAMER.

JASON encouraged Blair to introduce *LifeCare* CEO **Randy Langford**, **Mike Robnett** to stump for **Ray Huffines'** brother, **Phillip** (who introduced his Senatorial campaign assistant, **David Sedeno**), **Roy Reeves** to welcome back aviation mechanic **Bob Von der Saar**, and **Sara Akers** to introduce (her *Plano Children's Theater* Board member) **Jenny Duva**.

Nevertheless, he praised our "great work" by presenting us with the Four-Way Test Speech Contest Award...yet again. And, yet again, we accepted it as our due without acknowledging the role played by the con-

The latter was boasted by a \$1M endowment from a member's will, so he urged us all to see to Rotary within our own wills.

Alex Johnson wanted credit given to the man handling the 4-Way Test Contest, John Caldwell. He is due not only credit but cooperation.

Prince Horné had a spate of **announcements** to get through. He urged us to patronize the Allen Americans hockey team saying, "This from someone who can't skate." He honored everyone who worked at the Samaritan Inn event, and he implored us to attend the 4-Way Speech Contest to be held on Saturday, March 31st, at Sara's theater in Willowbend. That event needs "good speaker, good judges, and good helpers." He announced a "Spring Fling" with Interacters attending a Model UN Conference on 6/2 in Chicago. Turning to Plano Clubs, Rick noted Metro's Mardi Gras Casino Night and Pioneers' Sip & **Sample** event at Oakpoint Nature Reserve. The "end of May" (it's not clear which end; it has two), we'll have another food drive for some food bank beyond *Minnie's*. We'll do that in the name of **Rep. Sam Johnson** when he's on the program. And, finally, please pay your dues invoice. With

Olin Jaye commented upon Janis' interest in Texas relics, presuming that she didn't mean him. Then he got down to the business of introducing the speaker.



Steve Guengerich is the Executive Director for the Institute for Innovation and Entrepreneurship at the *University of Texas at Dallas*, where he leads an

organization focused on launching innovative, new ventures, both as startups and within existing businesses. His topic today (The Spark: How Entrepreneurship Set *UT Dallas* on Fire) updates the story of *UTD* on the eve of its 50th Anniversary.

Mr. Guengerich (MBA TAMU) praised the Club for all it's doing. He asked for a show of hands of *UTD* alumni, and, given the age of the University compared to the average age of members of the *Geriatric Club of Plano*, he received few votes. A few more raised their hands in response to a query about children (or grandchildren) attending. **Ric Kasmiskie** volunteered one getting a degree in *Art & Technology*.

Ignoring *Telecomm Valley*, Steve said that as impressive as Austin's computing facilities are, "*it's not the* **Silicon Valley** *of Texas*." The major economic hubs of Texas are linked in cooperation "*to supersede Silicon Valley*." Texas has an enormous economy, dwarfing that of most countries. (It has the 10th largest



economy, ahead of South Korea, in fact.) "And Dallas is the center of all that activity." And key to the City's economic development is a university "founded by entrepreneurs: (Cecil) Green, (Eugene) McDermott, and (Eric) Johnson." UTD is "#1 among Young Universities in the nation."

Steve landed here after 12 years in Houson (condolences) and 23 years in Austin where he was "looking to spending all my time with youngsters." (Nothing creepy about that!) So he moved the "center of hot activity," UTD, with its 23K students and 30 buildings erected in the last decade alone. He encouraged us all to come get lost on campus.

He is involved with **Blackstone Launch Pad** which supports UTD faculty and students with entrepreneurial training, helping "arm them with contacts and money" (venture capital). It is "turning out the largest classes of entrepreneurs..." (missing comparative) And "more than 50% of the economic activity is startups." **Blackstone** has the blessing of Texas Manifesto, Capital Factory, Venture Capital and Startup World. These are "angel networks around the State bringing startups together with investors." (...sort of super business incubators of the sort that UTD fostered 30 years ago)



John Caldwell wanted to know what's starting up. Steve told him there is a Dallas Accelerator exclusively for retail, and one in Austin is devoted to sports, technology, fashion and foods. So they're "not just a bunch of techies."

Olin Jaye wanted some comment on Richardson as a proposed site for Amazon HQ2, seeing as how UTD has a lot of land. He learned that President Benson is using University assets to bid for HQ2. Dallas and Texas in general is very attractive to major corporations. "*It's a huge advantage.*"

Hayden Padgett asked what Austin tech is moving to Dallas. Houston, Dallas, and Austin have invested ~\$6M each in an I-35 corridor high-end bus service. "Dallas is getting its mojo back."

Ric Kasmiskie asked about other major cities in Texas like El Paso. Steve said that they're "not nearly at the same stage." Since "El Paso has eager workers," Austin's Capital Factory is "planting a flag" there.

Hayden wanted to know the impact of high speed rail (up the I-35). *"Whenever it gets going, the more the better."*

Drince Dorné offered Mr. Guengerich our multiport charger. Steve said that, as a tech guy, "I can use it." Rick went on to tell an apocryphal story about an environmental chemist (mentioning no names) doing a well survey at a farmhouse where the owner said the well was dug back in '34. He noticed a three-legged pig, and the farmer said, "You mean Harvey? He's one smart pig!" The hogs are slopped in the morning, but one day the farmer fell and was trapped beneath his tractor and couldn't slop them. Harvey wasn't fed and sought out the farmer, rutting him to safety. (Little Timmy has fallen down the well, Lassie!) The chemist asked how that story related to Harvey missing leg. "Well, a pig that smart...you don't eat him all at one time." Thus was Rick inducted into the fabled
