Nancy Humphrey introduced a Real Estate Mogul Mike Friedman eager to capture Place 4 on the *PISD* Board of Directors. Earl Simpkins welcomed wife, Barbara, daughter, Alice, and (unrelated) Pamela Ziegler Petty. He also welcomed two of Myrtle's guests: Fred and Mazzie Moses. Yoram Solomon bade us greet David Johnson, and Chris Phillips introduced D.J. Horn.





Nathan permitted **Jim McGee** to "*plea for sanity*" and solicit "*requests*" for service once he's elected to the City Council. Phil Dyer requested "*a couple of beers*," in the tradition of **Old San Fran**-**Cisco** politics, but he was ig-

nored. Jim's seeking to fill **Pat Gallagher's** Place 7 and claimed an endorsement therefrom to the effect, *"Keep an Irishman here"* in office. **Alex Johnson** piped up with a guest, **Cal Greer**. Noting *"lots and lots"* of Myrtle's *"distinguished"* guests, Nathan asked them all to stand; half the room rose to their feet!

Yoram Solomon stumped for the March 30th Golf Tournament benefitting the PISD Education Foundation. He sought especially sponsors.

Earnest introduced today's **MASTER OF CEREMONIES** to present our Annual Black History Month program, W.T. Greer, a man with "a world renowned voice." But not, apparently, world renowned vision; W.T. pulled out "a new addition" to his wardrobe, glasses, to accompany his new suit, "the biggest I've ever had!" So far, he was preaching to the choir.



He said that our program theme was the Legacy of Black Heritage, but that there is "*no other Culture except People*." Wisely, he shied away from introducing any significant number of Myrtle's guests, but he couldn't resist noting the presence today of **Art** and **Betty Stranz**. At



90, Art is the oldest living Mayor of Plano, and he received an ovation, the loudest from **Harry LaRosiliere**, Phil Dyer, **Pat Evans**, and **Florence Shapiro**, all of whom know first-hand the rigors of the office! W.T. said that he has been "*in the Green Room*" with "*a lot of politicians*," and these were "*real people*."



W.T. then introduced **Derrick Brookins**, the Director of the *Plano Senior Choir*. He invited the Choir to assemble and us to enjoy the ensemble.



Derrick provided drum accompaniment to the Choir's rendition of an African-American spiritual, *"Keep Your*



Lamp" (trimmed and burning; the time is drawing nigh). Their professional delivery earned the group heart-felt applause. For their second and final spiritual, the Choir wowed the audience with "Daniel, Daniel, Servant to the Lord."

Apologizing implicitly, W.T. drew out a 4-page intro.

What follows is a catastrophically curtailed version of that biographical treatise.

Carl S. Richie, Jr., is considered among Texas' top power lobbyists. *Capitol Inside* recently ranked him as the 23rd top Hired Gun lobbyist. [He is] ranked...fourth...as the lead lobbyist for the energy giant TXU Energy.

He began his investigative career serving as a Fellow to a member of the United States Congress...Carl went on to serve as a legislative assistant for two state senators. He also served as Deputy Chief of Staff to Texas Governor **Ann W. Richards**. While serving in the Governor's Office, he led the Governor's Ethics Task Force, which established the creation of the Texas Ethics Commission. He later served as the agency's Acting Director.

Carl is a skilled administrative litigator...He has participated in a wide array of contested and negotiated proceedings before state and federal regulatory agencies.

Currently, Carl serves as Vice Chair of the Board of Commissioners for the Housing Authority of the City of Austin. He has earned the highest awards given to public housing commissioners, including the **Elizabeth B. Wells** Memorial Award by the National Association of Housing and Redevelopment Officials (NAHRO), the Commissioner's Public Service Award from the Southwest Regional Council of NAHRO, and twice as Commissioner of the Year Award by the Texas Chapter of NAHRO.

B.S., TAMU Commerce, M.P.A., TSU, J.D., Univ. of Houston Law Center.

[He is currently] Board Member of Sendero Health Plans, Treasurer of Austin Area Research Organization, Board President of Southwest Housing Compliance Corporation, Commissioner of Austin Affordable Housing Corp. and Housing Authority of the City of Austin, member of Commissioners Committees for NAHRO, Southwest Regional Council of NAHRO, and Texas Chapter of NAHRO.



Carl said that he was "*delighted with Rotary's mission*," because it means we share with him a life of community service. He is proud of our elementary school mentoring as well as RI's work in the eradication of Polio.

He recognized Fred and Florence, praising the latter for her work as for-

mer mayor, public school teacher, and Texas State senator. And for "*giving me a hall pass*" for missing a 3 pm meeting.

And he is proud of himself for having "*aligned my business with my civic*" activities without a conflict of interest. He adopts our *Service Above Self* motto.

Two days after Mayor **Kirk Watson** was voted into office in Austin, he made his first appointment. It was Carl, who was set to go on a well-deserved vacation at 5 pm, but got the call earlier in the day. It was to a stumbling Housing Authority, and, over his 14-year tenure, Carl has turned it into "the best agency in the country." But when he was appointed, he asked his wife, "Why me?" She told him, "Your whole life has prepared you for this call to service." She reminded him that he grew up in public housing. His academic thesis had been on Urban Homesteading. It involved the creation of a public agency, the Houston Housing Authority, which has become a model.

He had worked with Senator **Barney Frank** on agencies and commissions that had oversight on HUD. When he staffed a campaign for the Houston City Council he had worked for public housing. These were each reason enough for an appointment let alone all of them together.

Austin's Housing Authority is "the Gold Standard for public housing, an award-winning program." It offers job training and scholarships, funneling 325 kids through college on \$825K in scholarships. It has developed Dropout Pre-



vention programs where staffers call in at the homes of truants. This has resulted in the "lowest dropout rate" of any such program. And the after-school tutoring has raised GPAs.

In a marvelously innovative move, the authority purchased a shopping center, cutting the rent of client stores who hire project residents. The shops also offer deep discounts to low-income kids. Google Fiber has wired all 18 public housing developments, offering free wi-fi for three years. Ford Foundation grants and other fundraising have ensured that Austin is "transforming public housing."

Graduates from the projects are entering the workplace and public service. The Chief of Staff for Austin's Metro was one such.

All of this is done under the philosophy that "if you focus on others, you will receive more in return." He cited Rotary as an exemplar. "I commend you and all that you do."

Then the program was

turned over to **Doc Gibbs**, who synopsized his own personal history. "Twenty <mumble mumble> years ago...when I was 10" he was working on a degree in microbiology when someone hired him to sing. It sent him on the inexorable path



to entertainment. But his studies "of history at Harvard" had led him to an "understanding of Black History" that he has been teaching to students in PISD.

He characterized our host, W.T., as "tall, dark, and handsome, and I've got two of those." He praised "Dr. Hightower" as "the *real celebrity among us*" to a standing ovation of Myrtle.

Doc favored us with an analysis of the Negro Spiritual as having evolved from songs

sung in the cotton fields that didn't trouble the masters. But the drums at night were presumed to be inter-slave communication channels, so they were taken away.

Slaves had been indoctrinated with the religion of their masters, including stories about Moses "who is here today." They knew about Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego from the Book of Daniel. Doc claimed he'd heard it as "Shadrach, Meshack and Abadnegro." But the tales of Life in the Hereafter were interpreted as emancipation from slavery, so the spirituals became guidebooks for escape. Like "Steal Away Home, I ain't got long to stay here." And, in reference to carriages carrying slaves to freedom on the Underground Railroad, "Swing low, Sweet Chariot, coming for to carry me home." Harriet Tubman cautioned to foil bloodhounds via "Wade in the Water; God's gonna trouble the water." And her mission to thwart slavery was sung as "Let My People Go," which refrain we were invited to chant.

Doc claimed he'd made us all "honorary Black people" with the Call and Response. Then, honoring Myrtle's insistence that he heat up the house, he launched into "Tell Me What I Say," "Well I Feel All Right Now," and, recommending that Myrtle rock in her seat, "dancing cheek to cheek," he concluded with "Down Home Blues" and "What a Wonderful World" in proper Satchmo fashion. It earned him a standing ovation.

Earnest bestowed upon all the speakers a calendar that "lasts into perpetuity." W.T. thanked the committee that structured the program, "especially those that cooked the food."

President Wonderful led us in the Four-Way Test before releasing us to our own recognizance.
