Kelly Graham was asked to repeat her winning performance for us today. Her speech decried our declining humanity. "Have we stopped caring?" she asked, rhetorically. "Volunteering has declined. (Charitable) donations have flat-lined."



She claimed "it's the TRUTH" that apathy is on the rise. The example she gave was from her own life: playing a videogame that encourages development of bacteria that cause a worldwide plague. She watched, gleefully, as the population of the world declined then exulted as it went to zero! "Didn't bother me at all."



Under FAIRness, she cited the First World's delayed response to the Third World's Ebola epidemic (not bacterial but viral this time). While it was knocking off Africans, the U.S. merely tisked. Only when it threatened to cross continents, the U.S. and Europe reacted.

"Caring is contagious." Thus, BENEFICIAL. "If we can be taught to hate, then we can be taught to love." GOODWILL results when love becomes inherent. It makes "Life worth living."

After the applause, John presented Kelly Graham with a "winner's" check, as only appropriate. Kelly <u>Palmer</u> noted, "It's amazing how many people named 'Kelly' do well." Then he called upon **Olin Jaye** to introduce the speaker, asking if he too was a Kelly? Olin minced, "I can be a Kelly if you want me to, big boy." Then returned to his macho self to greet Ms. **Via**, "Hi, **Jo**!"

Charles Gressle, current CEO of *The Medical Center of Plano*, joined up in Nov. 2013 from the CEO position at the *Medical Center Dallas* Hospital. He has also been a Senior VP for HCA in its Denver offices. He began his career as a CNA and EMT paramedic, so



he knows health care from the bottom up. He and his wife have four children. Mr. Gressle is a trustee of the *DFW Hospital Council*. Olin concluded his remarks by saying how fond we all are of "*Plano General*."

Ignoring that dated remark, Charles praised Olin for being Citizen of the Year AND agreeing to serve on MCP's Board next year. Then he waded hip-deep into the miasma that is the Affordable Care Act (ACA) without once calling it *Obamacare*, a legacy from which, judging by Tuesday's State of the Union Address, the President is not shrinking.

Charles pointed out that although ACA affects a mere 5-10% of healthcare clients, it "dominates the discussion." The upshot is that, whereas there were many uninsured patients unable to pay for their medical services, ACA has ensured that more of them can now remunerate hospitals in compensation for resources used. So hospital stocks are on the rise, about 1/3 due to the fact that ACA allows the insurance indigents to foot their bills.

On the other side of the fence, *Blue Cross Blue Shield* has lost its shirt betting that the ACA-insured would consume services at historical rates. Instead, those with chronic conditions, brought about by years of neglect due to an inability to pay for medical services, are now costing BCBS millions more than their premiums bring in.



Health Exchanges are losing money too.

As a result, many insurers are returning to the bad old days of Preferred Care Providers. Networks are narrowing to only discount medical provision. "UT Southwestern is not accepting any exchange patients." Reimbursements for those fall below Medicaid payments! But insurers are scrambling to produce "more options with lower price."

Canny employers are, instead of <u>insuring</u> their employees, passing out subsidies to permit workers to seek their own medical insurance options. Rates go up. Cigna, for example, needs "margins to support its investors," so consolidation of companies is on the rise to create leverage (over providers, presumably). The dozen hospitals of HCA fights leverage with leverage. As their vision says, "We are committed to the care and improvement of human life."

Charles crowed about expansion at MCP using a drone photo to encompass a new \$150M Critical Care campus.

Lenny asked about the bond ratings prior to ACA. Charles pointed out that the merger/acquisition fever was, in part, driven by bond downgrade to upgrade ratio of 3:1. But the ACA delayed that.

Patti asked if new patients meant "hospitals are filling up." She was told there's "a lot more managed care."

Medicare payments permit hospitals to "break even or lose. Medicaid pays even less." However, "we're unique in the area."



Larry Flannery noted that "you're the only hospital (in the area) that pays taxes." Charles admitted to paying \$11M in taxes but maintained, "it's still a level playing field. There's no advantage either way.

quality is the same or better."

The bond rating of *Presbyterian* was depressed by their (mis)handling of that Ebola patient.

Patti Schwartz posited that perhaps we have "too many hospitals?" Charles agreed that elsewhere in Collin County, hospitals are closing, giving "us lots of their patients." But it's a lottery; "You make a killing on 1 in 10 patients." For example, Doc-in-the-Boxes can survive "off of eight patients a day in emergency care."

Sainted Editor pointed out he had but eight minutes to get to his press conference, and Charles wasted half of them explaining the new media's frenzy over the successful delivery by a 54-year-old mother of her own healthy granddaughter! (...via an implanted egg and copious hormones, her daughter being barren)

So VP for Business Development and City Councilman Ben Harris took over the reins. As Charles hurried out, Ben commented, "I just need to keep talking 'til my boss gets out the door."



Ben charged at flicker speed through the PowerPointTM, providing yet another **Death** by 1,000 Statistics moment. He pointed to MCP's charity work with Sarika Pride (Principal of Memorial Elementary, our adopted school, of which Ben seemed unaware). After leading us in the Four-Way Test (John Caldwell teased Kelly Graham that she had surely memorized it), Kelly Palmer finally released us at 1:05.
