Olin then introduced **M'Lou Hyttinen**, the Executive Director of the **HERITAGE FARMSTEAD MUSEUM** in Plano.

She thanked us for the invitation (extended at the last minute when another speaker canceled, so <u>we</u> should be thanking her) and said that though she respects all Plano Rotaries, she has a special place in her heart for this one, being the largest and housing "so many friends."

M'Lou said she "grew up on a farm in Garland" where she "raised quarter horses," so the **IFM** is "like coming home." No quarter horses there but they did recently "have a chicken incident." She declined to elaborate.



is now a 4-acre site, down from its original 365 acres, so "blink, and you'll miss it" at its 15<sup>th</sup> & Custer location. (Well, actually 15<sup>th</sup> and Pittman.) The Museum is into "preservation and sustainability," keeping the "original buildings as they were laid out," but renovating them in their original style.

Many of Plano's old Victorian dwellings are now gone, "but our residents never changed" theirs. The Farrells owned the place, and when wife Ammie divorced Hunter, she retained the property. They were predominantly a sheep ranch, carrying 400 head. (Ric Kamiskie, in a surfeit of helpfulness, moved the lectern away from the screen, upsetting the [connected] projector into the bargain.) M'Lou promised to keep stories about Olin and the sheep to herself.

The original farm was purchased by the City, which still owns it; **IFM** "provides the preservation services." The farm is 127 years old; "our goal is another 200 years!"

They're working on a **Vision Plan**; it's going to involve recreating the "openness of the farm. We'll recreate one of the barns down by [Pittman] creek." The group's **Passion** is "excellence in history, in Agricultural Education" but also **Fun**. It teaches 10K kids annually, immers-



ing them in farm history because "kids these days don't have that as history." Funding problems have prevented them from reaching all of PISD schools, but they've included other districts and home schools as well. This season's field trips are already sold out.

We adults are not forgotten. We get Fish Fries, lecture programs, a BBQ & Beer Fundraiser, and an Adult Egg Hunt. (What's an adult egg? A contradiction in terms?) Apparently, adults hunt eggs in the dark, "inspired by Olin," she claimed. It raised over \$10K from the 400 tickets sold.

**IFM** offers standing and temporary exhibits and serves as a "beloved community venue" for weddings, graduation parties, memorial services, and an annual Plano Fire Department Picnic!

It manages livestock including sheep, goats, pigs, chickens, turkeys, and **Pancho** the Donkey. 500 volunteers from churches and other institutions, including *Toyota Corp* oversee everything, including a gift shop. All are managed by a dedicated staff of seven.

The City of Plano offers funding from the Hotel/Motel Tax via the Culture Commission. The venue hosts 35K visitors a year. Attendance and funding are up at 30% & 50%, respectively. "The Future is Bright."

After a bid for us to become members (application flyers were on the tables) and for us to help connect **LFM** to others, M'Lou took questions.

Janis Allman asked whether there were any great-grandsheep among the herd. M'Lou said the farm hasn't the breed that Ammie Wilson had; they have the Hampshire breed.

Janis asked after **Chicken Nugget**, the rooster who had died last week. M'Lou said that was the incident, a weasel wiped out the hen house for fun.

Ric Kasmiskie asked how the museum is certified. M'Lou said a peer investigation awarded IFM its accreditation. And that wasn't compromised by Ammie Wilson's reputation as a poker madam, loathed by the wives of the men she played with.

Carrolyn the Petite thanked her for her

flexible schedule, cautioned Board members to stay after the meeting, led us in the Four-Way Test, and belled us out at 1:05.

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
