John Parker introduced historian and raconteur, **Jim Gatewood**, currently a professor at *Richland College*. Jim writes books and gives lectures on figures and events in Dallas history. Today's talk was on "*Benny*

Jim began telling tales of **Mark Wayman**, the *Godfather of Las Vegas*. How 18,000 guests crowded Mark's 83rd birthday celebration while **Willie Nelson** and **Hank Williams** performed. But this was merely context for the Binion story since both arrived in Dallas

in 1923. Gangsters all.

As a youth, Benny cut school, never completing a formal education. While fighting a bully, he was about to lose consciousness from strangulation when he pulled a knife and severed his opponent's hamstring. Word spread that he'd actually killed that **Bill Hobbs**, but as the Sheriff approached, Benny lit out of town on a troop train. By the time it had reached El Paso, he'd made \$600 managing a dice game for the soldiers. He tried to join up, but recruiters wouldn't take a seasoned gambler.



From El Paso, he crossed the Rio Grande to Juarez, there to take advantage of the Volstead Act that pushed booze storage into Mexico. Benny got 5% of all the traffic. He took the same cut from gun running.


When an argument with a Federal Officer ended in proof that Benny's .38 Colt was superior to the Fed's single action revolver, he was struck by the officer's colleague and awoke in a



Mexican jail. He was sprung by Texas Marshall, **Frank Bass**, who told him to flee to Dallas, leaving his Juarez enterprises to the Marshall. Gangsters all. But Bass did give him a letter of (anti-) recommendation to Mafioso **Joe Civello**.

On the strength of that, Benny was put in charge of the Mafia's liquor stash in Dallas. He sold it on the street opposite the Adolphus Hotel. **Warren** "Knuckles" **Diamond** used Benny as a middleman turning \$5 barrels of beer into \$45 barrels in the Roaring 20s. As Warren was dying of cancer, he bequeathed all his many (illegal) businesses to Benny, who, at age 26, was the #1 gambler in Dallas, owning 27 casinos in the city alone, paying off the Mayor (\$60K) and City Councilmen (\$20K). When Councilman **Felix Washburn** sought a second \$20K on the strength of a threat to tell the FBI, Benny sent him the \$20K in counterfeit currency.

All was well until 1938, when a massive drug bust put Civello in jail. **Sheriff Bill Decker** summoned Benny to "deputize" him to run all drug dealers out of town or face the same fate as Civello. Benny chose dis-



In 1946, **Estes Kefauver** made a deal with the Devil in the form of Jewish Mafia Boss **Meyer Lansky** because he needed Mafia support in his (eventually failed) bid for the White House (Eisenhower was elected handily).

Kefauver's committee was investigating organized crime, but permitted the Mafia to find a state where gambling was legal, Nevada. Benny and **Bugsy Siegel** moved into Las Vegas, but Benny's *Horseshoe Casino* pulled in



\$420 per minute, 24 hours a day, and earned Benny a fortune that put Bugsy to shame.

The old Cowboy Killer (so named for his style of executions), bought Montana property from **H.L. Hunt** and lived to a ripe old age of 85.

Jim offered to autograph his books for us for \$30 each, saying that they were easy to write for each was "low-hanging fruit."

KIFK gifted him with our Rotary clock, led us in the Four-Way Test, and belled us out at 1:01.
