Evans captivated the audience and judges to be named Miss Texas 2014. An accomplished ballerina, she won the talent scholarship and the interview scholarship awards to achieve the title over 51 other contestants from all around the state of Texas.

She is traveling across the state promoting her message of "Remember Your Heart: One Beat at a Time" and will speak to thousands of students, encouraging them to take the "Miss Texas 48-hour Challenge" to ensure young people will maintain a healthy lifestyle. Monique competed at the Miss America Pageant and was named as a Top 15 Finalist.

David concluded, "And she threw out the first pitch at a Rangers game."

Monique reiterated (for those who'd attended the Citizenship Award Program) that her father had been a Rotarian in Florida. She admitted to "an unusual childhood" which involved growing up in Far West Texas (or should that be Far West, Texas?), moving to California, having her family sell everything they owned except the red suburban which they used to tour 47 states. Later she IDed KY, MT, and VT as the three states she missed on their whirlwind tour.



Next they tackled the world, hitting 87 countries, "backpacker-style." They sought out world history and culture, diving, for example, to sunken battleships in Guam. Later, on her tour as Miss Texas, she met ex-servicemen in Waco who had fought the Battle for Guam.

Her first kiss had been in Egypt, a peck on the cheek from a cheeky Egyptian boy who fled in terror on seeing her Father. Eventually, she returned to Texas and school and ballet class.

As a child, she "never had the courage to tell my own story." She was "shy, and had no voice in class." But she thought the best way to overcome that was to enter the Miss Texas competition, which she lost three years running. Year One: 8th place. Year Two: 11th place. Year Three: 16th place. Then she took up travels again, this time all around the State.

He gathered up neighbors, adding them to the crowd upstairs as water filled the home. The fridge floated up to bang the downstairs ceiling.

They watched cars and homes float away, but theirs withstood the storm. The next morning, several of those who spent the night found no homes to which to return.

She vowed, "I'm not going back when Grandma turns 100!"

Earnest asked her the hard questions. How old? 23. What weight? "100," she lied, but added that she'd have to work it for bikini season. Aspirations? To become a physician in preventative medicine.
