

Lenny Schwartz, promising PDG David that he'd not cut into his time, proceeded to take several minutes to announce sweeping changes to come in his administration. First will be the implementation of Corporate Membership, begun under Juhn and framed by famed policy wonk,

Camille Ussery and crew. The regulations governing corporate members were approved for presentation to the Club, will be emailed to members, and will be voted upon at a later date. Lenny finally relinquished the floor to Octavio, giving PDG David fewer than 20 minutes to speak. Octavio thus raced through the introduction:

Dave was born and raised in San Angelo, Texas. As the son of a Dad who was a WWII combat veteran and a hardworking stay-at-home Mom, Dave learned core values of a strong spiritual faith, work ethics, and belief in his own commonsense early in life. He had a 40-year career in residential and commercial construction, the last 26 of those as President and CEO of his own company, primarily designing and building hotels in multiple states.

Dave has been a very active Rotarian since 1984, serving in local, national, and international capacities, including North Texas District Governor and as speaker at the International Convention in Birmingham, England. Dave was a Keynote Speaker at Rotary District Conferences in Oklahoma, Texas, and for District 4420, in Brazil, last month. He and Marilyn also served as RI President **Kalyan Bannerjee's** Presidential Representatives to the District 5650 conference in Omaha two weeks ago.

Even though he is a professional speaker, Dave said, "Lecterns make me nervous." So he picked up the microphone and roamed as far as its cord permitted.

He last spoke to us as DG; shortly after that, he made the same presentation at

Richardson East. He noticed his vision filling with floaters "like a plague of locusts." He stabilized himself by leaning on the lectern, then, at the talk's finish, he greeted people from a seated position because he was unsteady. His wife suggested a hospital visit, but they passed three *en route* to home without stopping.

The next day he was to present to his home Club, but as he raised his razor to shave, it disappeared! He had gone blind in his left eye. Classic male: tough it out. The physician his wife enforced upon him told him he'd not be speaking today; he was suffering from a stroke. It had attacked a key area for memory: the hippocampus. But, due to "brain plasticity," other areas compensated, and he recovered.

That plasticity now represents his message. We can change our brains almost as easily as we can change our minds, so to speak. We can choose to learn, grow, and accomplish our freshlyminted goals. However, his



message came with a spiritual component: the human species, he said, is blessed with unique gifts that make these things possible and have led to our domination (for better or worse) of the planet.

Among our "unique" adaptations, he mentioned "opposable thumbs," but we share those with all great apes and some monkeys. Opossums even have opposable toes! Next he lauded self-awareness as uniquely human, but many species can admire themselves in a mirror, proving they know who they are. And lastly, only we humans "can make choices." But animal researchers routinely give their subjects choices, and, once the animal has analyzed the risk-reward, it inevitably makes the

advantageous choice. That's not instinct; that's planning for an understood future state.

But David was not speaking biologically; he was trying to persuade us to take advantage of the gifts that we may or may not share with others. He wanted us to understand that we are not condemned to our routines and our "pity parties." Instead, we can take our lives by the horns and steer them in a better direction.

And this is a happy result of not being "hard-wired." Not being creatures of instinct. Taking advantage instead of the elasticity of our brains. It used to be thought that once an electrical connection was made in the brain, it was fixed like in a computer, but since 1999, the plasticity of the brain has been accepted. That's a big step forward from **Galen's** observation in 435 BCE that the brain controlled the rest of us via the nerves. And there has been no more public notice of that than **Gabby Gifford's** remarkable recovery of functionality by rewiring her own damaged brain.

All of this came to him when he lost his business because a sharp operator successfully refused to pay for his company's construction of three hotels. He moped



about feeling sorry for himself until **Marilyn** asked him, "How long would you like to feel like this?" She recommended he go on the speaker circuit, so he wrote "Gonna Jump? Take a parachute!" and found his sense of purpose.

Now he wants us to find ours. "Make the rest of your life the best of your life."

He called Lee Dunlap, the birthday boy, up to receive a free copy of his book, and announced its availability in the back of the hall.

John gave PDG David our medallion and credit for Shoes for Orphan Souls. He gave **Bob Botts** his missing 15-year certificate ("solid gold with silver inlay") and recognized **Rick Maucieri** for a question. Rick asked, "If a governor walks into the room late, does anyone notice him?" in reference to a tardy Ean Sullivan. But the question didn't merit an answer because Ean is only a DGE.
