Well, it does have its perquisites; I'm taking my adorable wife, Patricia, to China




this June. We're going on a tour led by Plano Multicultural Outreach Roundtable Co-

PRINCE JOHN confirmed the need

for sponsorships and called for a meeting of Soap Box Derby volunteers at 1 pm, following Rotary. He then introduced the day's speaker, **Wes Cunningham**, Ed. D., Principal of the Frisco ISD's Career and Technical Education Center. In his own words*: I have a BA from Southern Methodist University, with a major in history. I was

awarded a Master of Education Degree by Texas A&M University-Commerce in 2002 and my Doctor of Education Degree by Texas A&M University-Commerce in 2007. I have been a teacher, an athletic trainer, and assistant principal in Richardson ISD. I was an assistant principal at Centennial HS and Liberty HS in Frisco ISD prior to being named Principal of the CTE Center and Director of Career & Technical Education in Frisco ISD in the spring of 2007. I am blessed to be married to a fantastic and supportive wife and we have two wonderful children.

Wes described the *CTE Magnet School* as an economical alternative to *CTE* distributed over all of FISD. He said that

it was essential to combat dropouts and to motivate students to attend and perform.

They begin with no need for a firm commitment to any career. They try on careers through semester-long courses until they find something that excites their interest. Then they take off on it.

Vocational Education has a bad rap. It is viewed as the dumping grounds for students who have no aspirations or academic abilities. But his *CTE* is not for students "who can't hack it." Instead, it concentrates on innovation, creativity, and critical thinking just as do the college prep curricula. Indeed, their students are encouraged to go on to college, and a significant number of them (93%) do.

In 1997, FISD decided to bring rigor to *CTE*. They went on the road, searching for Best Practices at 60 existing *CTE* operations across the Southwest. Susan mentioned later that they did research on Wylie's *CTE* programs. FISD was looking for excellence in curricula, but it also interviewed students for their opinions.

What resulted was what Wes clearly thinks is a model for *CTE*. It includes a 126,000 square foot building designed for just that purpose, housing real-world learning laboratories. It incorporates stores, managed and staffed by students.


There's a TV studio and Animation Workshop as well as a restaurant-deli run by the Culinary Arts students and open to the public.

Essentially co-located across the street is the Preston Ridge Branch of *Collin College*, which offers joint credit for many courses. And the campus is the site for a future Frisco

high school.

FISD busses the 1,800 students from their home campii to and from their classes at *CTE*. These students have a higher

attendance and graduation rate with lower dropouts than those without access to the program. And this improvement is not confined to FISD but rather is observed throughout the State.

Wes treated us to a PowerPoint TM tour of his facility with its ubiquitous plasma screens constituting graphics boards on which are touted the current achievements of its student body. He is proud of his flexible class spaces and green technology wherein floors, sinks, and even toilets are made from recycled materials. But while the Physical Plant may be from old materials, the curriculum is cut from current standards. For example, the Animation Studio runs on what is now standard in the industry, Apple's Final Cut Pro; students earn their certification on that software. The Design Studio is abandoning the old standard, AutoCAD, for newer ones. Staff and students are learning to think "outside the box." (So Wal-Mart is not their final destination.)



Health Sciences currently is certifying 90 nurse's aides. And Wes is contemplating *CSI Frisco* as he adds a Forensics Laboratory.

Herb Hoxie asked about CTE's budget, and Wes told him that the building itself took \$33 million with a ½2 million operating budget.

Cary Israel talked of vocational tracks compared with college and spoke of students bouncing in and out of careers as part of a four-year plan.



Shawn Foster asked about tuition costs and was told its part of ADA.

Carole Greisdorf wondered how the public facilities run when the students are coming and going throughout the day. Wes said that the stores, restaurant and deli are staffed serially.





Susan explained the flashlight donation to *Memorial Elementary*, and then mentioned that she had only two more meetings to go before she retired. When confusion raised its ugly head, she said she referred to her WISD tenure as School Board Chair. She had 16 *Rotary* meetings to get through before her release.

After leading us in the Four-Way Test, she put one more meeting behind her at 12:57.
