former Emmy-Award-winning TV reporter, Jeff Crilley, will share the secrets to going above and beyond without breaking the bank.

Jeff retired from TV news after 25 years in the business to start the country's first "all-journalist" public relations firm. During his career he made hundreds of national news appearances including CNN, CNN Headline News, FOX News, The Discovery Channel, Good Morning America and The CBS Early Show.

Jeff has been recognized by his peers with dozens of national and regional awards including the Emmy, the National Headliners Award, the Edward R. Murrow Award, the Thurgood Marshall Award, and in 2004 was named by the Texas Associated Press, "The Best TV Reporter in the state."

Jeff's topic was "How to **Overdeliver** Without Going **Overbudget**." And it wasn't by wasting money on spell checkers.
