Olin Jaye introduced the day's speaker, our cur-

rent liaison with 5810, **Lisa Leach**. Her topic: *Rotary's Mission to Nicaragua*.

Lisa has been a Rotarian for the past 13 years and has served as the President of *Plano West Rotary*, and is currently serving as Assistant Gov-

ernor of all Plano Rotary clubs save her own. She is originally from Mobile, AL, and is a serial entrepreneur. She currently owns *Chiavari Chair Rentals of Dallas*, where she provides chair rentals for the wedding and special events industry. She and her husband moved to Dallas to take a position with *Nortel Networks*. After the downturn in the telecomm industry, she started a business brokerage firm, and sold companies for ten years. She has two boys and lives in Richardson.

She began her presentation asking for a show of hands of all who have been on a Nicaragua Mission for Rotary. Apparently pleased with the showing, she told us that she joined Rotary to do International Service Projects. But on joining, her oldest child was but six, so too young to join her or be left behind.

Now, however, he is 19, and when offered the chance to tag along, he said, "Yeah, sure; I'll go." But she hadn't confided in him about the challenges. They went with the second group; the missions are scheduled around Spring Breaks which come in two flavors for the Dallas environs.

Gov.-Elect **Bill Dendy** began the missions as a way to excite Rotoracters and Interacters to stick with Rotary. And it must have worked; on the current trip there were two families that each had three generations of participants. And the majority of the entire company was composed to young adults.

Next year they're looking to take 40, but more than that proves cumbersome. She was tickled to find that some of the participants had never before left Texas let alone the U.S. Two had attended Camp RYLA, and another two have been back every year.



She admitted to being geography challenged, but, Google Maps to the rescue, she soon located her destination. It was the City of Granada on the banks of Lake Nicaragua. There the company painted a school, set up basketball courts, ensured running water, and built both a kitchen and a classroom.

Due to a mixup regarding governmental permissions (insufficient bribe, perhaps?), the group went to a Special Needs School, *Corazón Contento*, or "*Happy Heart*." Special needs kids are shunned by Nicaraguan society. At the school, they give the kids skills to aid their survival. The group helped them make paper ornaments to raise funds for the school. They helped teach kitchen and gardening skills. And splitting into two groups, they painted the inside and the outside of the school with murals. There was so much to do, that their time ran out and they had to leave some tasks undone.

Lisa showed a video produced by a local Nicaraguan videographer. It showed the children and the visitors dancing in traditional costumes. (Smooth Zumba moves, Lisa.) The group had brought musical instruments. They also participated in Physical Therapy sessions.

Lisa's son finished the mural left undone by the first week's visitors, and she praised LB's painting of the latrine. "Oh," said FLASH, "that's what you call it!"

Her son also adorned the mural with a Turquoisebrowed Motmot or, as Nicaraguans call it, "*The Ravine Guard*" or Guardabarranco, the national bird of Nicaragua. He must be exceptionally talented.

5810 contributed the funds for the kitchen and

classroom. The before and after photos showed a dirt floor becoming a tiled showcase.

Nicaragua bests the U.S. on per capita sugar consumption! So diabetes is of even greater concern there. The school offers education in blood glucose and pressure testing.

The group travelled to one of the poorest areas in the country, an hour out of Granada. There they witnessed a barrio school and *The House of Dreams* which teaches English after school. Founder and Director **Jim Durham** established it in 2012. Fortunately, the 5810 group had brought school supplies, clothing, and shoes. *The House of Dreams* supplies one hot meal a day to those who would otherwise hunger.

They walked through impoverished neighborhoods, distributing candy (and, hopefully, diabetes education). They came face-to-face with the Third World.

On the plus side, they bonded as a group, getting to know one another while zip-lining. They were treated to the private island owned by the President of the *Granada Rotary*. (Way to contrast the 3rd World!) There was a lunch and a pool party beside but not <u>in</u> the lake; it is the only one with sharks.

After they returned, she was pleased to see a Facebook posting by her son praising the trip. He called it a "cool experience."

Lisa suggested that <u>The Plano Rotary Club</u> sponsor an Interact or Rotaract participant at one of the two trips scheduled for 2017.

Olin asked about the availability of supplies. Lisa said it's like shopping used to be half a century ago; there are no big box, general purpose stores. You must buy from individual vendors. Next time she'll bring her own paint brushes.





Patti Schwartz asked about their access to sugar and was told that sodas are ubiquitous. Also rice and beans at every meal means lots of carbohydrates.

Ean, who has been on the mission, commented that security is not an issue. He and Jan walked unm ^O-

lested in the town square after midnight, tempting Fate. He "strongly recommend (s) taking children and grandchildren."

Lisa mentioned that the legal age to drink in 18, but a very strict curfew is in place.

Alex Johnson praised Lisa's present ^ation; she "brought it to life" for him.

Chris Henry mentioned that his son and daughter-in-law live in Nicaragua. He re ^c-ommended one studies Spanish or has a fluent speaker among the travelers.

Ean said the trip is economical; \$1,400 pays for it all. Kelly asked if Ean had zip -lined and was told it required bigger harnesses.

Kelly then warned of the dangers of Rotary paperweights and announced that stragglers today will be shot. Another group needs the room directly after our meeting. He led us in the Four-Way Test and belled us out at 1:04.
