"On a more serious note," began **Olin Jaye**, as he introduced the day's speaker...

Michael Ray Newman, *Zig Ziglar International* CEO & Executive Coach is an expert on People and Procedures.

Michael Ray's energetic and enthusiastic approach to all areas of his life best defines how he handles tasks as a professional speaker, trainer, inventor, coach and successful entrepreneur.

Michael's success in leadership comes from his lifestyle philosophy "**WHATEVER IT TAKES (W.I.T.)**" Michael leads by example as well action, not simply by empty lip service.

With a challenging learning disability and his background in the business world, Michael Ray has established himself as a true inspiration to others. His relentless pursuits of running smarter, more efficient operations, along with his out of the box ideology and turning those

ideas into multi-million dollar companies, has put him on the map as a prominent serial entrepreneur.

Olin concluded by reminding us that the late **Zig Ziglar** was a Plano resident, living a stone's throw from *Gleneagles!* His legacy is being carried by this "child of the oil patch."

Michael said that "every chance I get to speak about *Zig Ziglar, I take it.*" He told us that he stumbled upon Zig's philosophy in a box of cassette tapes given him by a baby clothes vendor as a deal sweetener! And the quotes

"You can get everything you want" and

"You don't have to be great to start, but you have to start to be great," resonated with him. "They have had an impact on me for years."



He suffers from dyslexia, and was diagnosed as "dumb as a box of rocks" by his teachers. That prompted him to learn how to speak publicly. Unfortunately, it also prompted him to learn how to cheat in school. "I'm not proud of it." Whenever he looks at a page of text, the letters just whirl unintelligibly.

His son was diagnosed and targeted for a Special Needs school. But, years later, the son graduated with a 3.2 GPA while participating in two sports. But Michael himself was tested at 30 years of age at a 7th grade reading level. So he had to develop a methodology for learning. And Ziglar tapes helped, at least until his truck's tape player ate them.

Zig Ziglar passed away three years ago. Ziglar's son invited Michael to become involved with ZZI. And he did to remedy the "leadership deficit" he sees in the country. And "leadership starts with the family unit."

He told us that during the recession, companies survived by "killing middle management," letting go guys ready to retire. Now that the economy has improved, leadership training has become a \$140M per annum business worldwide. Millennials are the toughest because "they don't have people skills." Computer skills don't cut it. Past generations wanted to improve life for their children; millennials just "want to be happy" as we've trained them!

His final thought was a question: “Are you a wandering generality or a meaningful specific?” The example of the former he gave was of the pine “precessionary caterpillar.” The follow one another blindly, and circles of them will track until they’re exhausted and die.



He teaches that successful people and procedures win the day. Although Ziglar has passed away, his spirit lives on in those he’s touched. Thus it will be with you. He spoke of applying this management principal to his family. He even had procedures for taking out the garbage. And, he claims, his family was successful because of it.

One must deal with three levels of living: survival, stability, and success. They have seen him through trying times: two home foreclosures and divorce papers filed by his wife on the dyslexia diagnosis for their child. But you

1. Take a bath
2. Get motivated
3. Stand up
4. Show up
5. Do what you say and
6. Say what you do.

Then prepare for the trials and tribulations of success! After the country club and multi-car garages, there is a danger of becoming irrelevant, “losing traction” by resting on your laurels.

As Kelly began his warning speech about the deadly paperweight, Michael commented excitedly, “Oh this is way better than (the



Richardson (club).” In order to forestall the inevitable lawsuit, Kelly explained patiently about the hazards of strong magnets.

Rick Maucieri touted Earnest Burke as Keynote Speaker at his **CITIZEN OF THE MONTH** school, and **Jeff Frauenheim** chimed in about his *Siglar Elementary*, not to be confused with Ziglar Elementary.
