THE ICEMAN COMETH



Plano Rotary's own inimitable **Chris Parr**, the intrepid world traveler, who several years ago attended Rotary's International meeting in Japan by traveling east not west; and, in so doing visited not only South America, but also Europe, Africa, and Asia. (One might surmise a "Wrong Way Corrigan", although "Around the World in Eighty Days" would be more correct.) He is also an avid photographer. His more recent trip to Antarctica fulfilled his desire to visit all continents and provided a

special treat for members to enjoy his photos of the trip in high definition.

Beginning with the two day passage from Ushuaia, Argentina across the 600 mile stretch of the Drake Passage, infamous for its gargantuan waves, to the many islands forming Antarctica, it was obvious that this was not for the faint hearted (nor for those who are easily sea sick).

Being the coldest, driest and highest area on earth, many would be prone to write off Antarctica; however, England, France, Chile, and Argentina have made conflicting claims to this territory over the years until the Antarctica Treaty was signed in 1959. It stipulates that the continent should be owned by



none and open to all for scientific purposes. In 1959, Antarctica was set up as an astronomical nation; it never rains or snows in the interior but has fog called "diamond dust" which has contributed to the 2 mile thickness of ice, rising to the polar plateau. There are beautiful fresh water lakes

beneath the glaciers as well as oil, no doubt.



Antarctica is twice as large as Australia and is larger than Europe. Amazingly, it is visited by 40,000 tourists each year and is inhabited by a population well over

5 million penguins, of which there are four species that nest on the continent. Although it is unlawful to approach a penguin within 15 feet,

but apparently there is no compunction on their part to approach any person. It seems they may be as curious about visitors as the visitors are about them. Penguins live on krill (shrimp-like creatures)



and krill live on plankton; they are more agile in the water (all but the

Emperors are approximately 12 inches tall, and they can go 10 mph under water) than on land where they can propel




themselves on the ice like sleds. Three species, Adelie, Chinstrap and

Gentoo, lay their eggs on the rocks; while the Emperors lay their eggs on their feet to

protect the egg (only one) from the ice. They have been seen standing still for two weeks to molt and grow new feathers.

Made up of thousands of islands, such as Deception Island, actually an active volcano whose caldera is 8 miles wide, Livingston Island, a nature preserve that cannot be visited, and Cuverville Island with Paradise Bay, Antarctica seems to be a true paradise for photographers



to such an extent that Lemaire Channel *aka* Kodak Alley is so permanently branded. It is no wonder that Chris is enamored with Antarctica.

Ten minutes was the answer. **Carole Greisdorf** wanted to know about calving due to global warming. Yes, Chris answered, the peninsula (red color above) has risen ½ °F in a decade. The beautiful blue color of the ice indicates recent calving events. And, yes (in response to Kirk's setup question), he has visited all seven continents!
