Mean Green takeover and determining a few shy of decisive victory, Doctor Smatresk made quick work of apologizing for ever leaving Texas after serving as Dean of Sciences at University of Texas at Arlington and being lured away by Hawaii and then Nevada before coming to his senses and returning in 2013 not only to lead "the biggest university no one's ever heard of," but also to be closer to his children.

While we all think of UNT as an Arts School... (even though Mike completely forgot to mention Lyle Mays as a graduate – just sayin') Smatresk took us on a brisk



tour of many departments rated in the top 10 nationwide such as Public Administration at 6th, Business' Logistics rated 3rd and Military History ranked somewhere in the top 5 or 10. He (allowably) bragged a 73% employment of graduates and citing the high tech concentration of North Texas as second only to Silicon Valley, has committed to developing first generation students into a strong future work force for the region.

He ran through an interesting new initiative, a three suite storefront in his administration office to facilitate access to technology and problem solving resources within the college to business and industry. He talked about some new housing they are putting up and some investment in growing the student housing at an affordable but safe level.

Kelly Palmer had to get all "Think Global" on us and asked what, given the chance, Dr. Smatresk would tell Washington to do to fix the student debt problem. He suggested everybody just come to UNT since they have a 73% placement rate and are cheap. (laughter) But mostly to invest in higher ed facilities and systems and loosen up foreign student restrictions that were tightened after 9/11 to help build the economy.
