Carrolyn started to welcome Olin to the lectern to introduce the North Texas Commission CEO, but the "A" team took over.




Hearing her sobriquet, **Jamee Jolly** introduced **Chris Wallace**, 10th President and CEO of the North Texas Commission.

During the 86th Texas Legislature, Wallace worked tirelessly to ensure that Texas remained business-friendly. Additionally, in his role at TAB, he oversaw operations including membership, marketing, strategy as well as board and chamber relations, and led the organization's successful efforts to defeat discriminatory and unnecessary legislation. He also has successfully built coalitions to advocate for the reauthorization of the Export-Import Bank, transportation funding, and the importance of NAFTA.

Prior to joining TAB, Wallace was the President/CEO of the Greater Irving-Las Colinas Chamber, the third largest chamber in North Texas and the first national Five-Star Accredited Chamber in Texas. He is among only 535 executives in the nation who have earned their Certified Chamber Executive designation.

Jamee hinted that Chris was her mentor in their youths, but Chris protested; he said the relationship was the other way around. Then he heaped praise on the Plano Chamber by saying that "You have the most highly recognized Chamber leadership in Texas."

As the room's AV had failed him (he was obviously used to better; his USB drive's presentation failed to be recognized but its video, at least, played), he mentioned that those of us wonks who wanted the stats (summarized below) could email him, and he'd send them to us.

The Commission was founded in 1971 (the year Sainted Contor joined UTD!) at a time when the Cities of Dallas and Fort Worth both wanted to be the home to a large, regional airport. The DOT and FAA told both to "work it out," and DFW Airport was born in the middle. The NTC has worked with the Airport Board to this day; Chris recently returned from such a meeting which was "getting back to routes." (Not "roots," mind you.)

DFW Airport is a big deal. It generates \$37B annually, 55% just from cargo! It maintains round-the-clock operations, and, with seven runways, manages to avoid congestion. "*There are no slot constraints here, no curfew for landings.*" 135K passengers pass through the 165 gates daily. It makes the area the #1 domestic destination (out of 182). It is #9 in the world for international destinations.

NTC is into marketing for additional airlines and advocacy for those already represented.

"North Texas" comprises over 9K square miles consisting of the 13 counties surrounding DFW. They house over 150 municipalities holding 7.4M people. It is currently the 4th largest metropolitan area in the country and, as is evidenced by the above, slated to grow, with Collin and Denton counties eclipsing the others in that regard.

NTC is a unique organization, bonding together public (40%) and private (60%) entities with cities, universities and community colleges as additional stakeholders. It is into long-term planning involving:

- 1. "Our unique ability to convene local officials," water districts, tollway authorities, even "administration and operations for the Super Bowl."
- 2. Commissioning of the study of revenue caps, using California's propositions to predict the effects on the North TX region.
- 3. Establishing advocacy forums like the North Texas Magazine that encourages relocation for businesses from outside the State.

As the "*fastest growing metropolitan area in the country*," N.TX is predicted to nearly double in population within the next 25 years. Already, 15 municipalities have populations of 100K or greater. New leaders for this growth are emerging from Leadership North Texas, which is Leadership Plano on steroids.

Advocacy is Job 1. NTC has six regional lobbyists who meet with bill authors in Austin, tracking meetings, testifying and taking notes (and names, no doubt). In that regard, NTC's model is the Greater Houston Partnership. He was embarrassed to report that although TX has almost 16M registered voters, it ranks last in voter turnout. NTC advocates to remedy that as well. Indeed, the State houses 28M Texans, but 7M don't vote. TX has "the fifth most restrictive" voter registration rules. It seems "the legislature doesn't want employees to vote."

NTC advocates for funds designated for some State purposes actually go to those purposes rather than into the General Fund. It advocates for education and school finance reform. It seeks to reform economic development tools to "*claw back* [donations] *from businesses not performing*" by failing to meet their promised hiring goals. And it advocates for business climate issues rather than the bathroom bills which so enamor the legislature.



Chris carefully excluded from his condemnation Religious Freedom Acts; he maintains they are "not a discrimination tool," but surely he's entitled to one faith-driven faux pas. He was, after all, big on school

safety issues, advocating for prevention of violence not securing bathrooms.



He lauded the Interim Commission on Education Finance Reform that seeks to increase funding with accountability.

Olin Jaye asked about Dallas' recent loss of an Amazon hub, and Chris maintained that it was a blessing in disguise. That DFW was on Amazon's short list will resonate well with others seeking to relocate or build. One measure of acceptance was that we were #12 in congestion compared with New York's #22.

John Caldwell asked about Love Field's gate restrictions. Chris said that they've no expansion opportunities.


Jeff Beckley thanked Jamee for volunteering to be on the Education Reform efforts.

Since "no one received a mandate" in the recent State elections, everyone has "to work both sides of the aisle." "Democrats now have more of a say."

To a question about numbers of voting age, Chris deferred to the State demographer. **Janis Allman** decried out-of-state students voting in-state. Chris recalled a cartoon of **Vladimir Putin** with an "*I voted today*" sticker.

Carrolyn gave Chris our tiny credit card USB drive and urged those who had not done so to fill out the venue survey or face her soft harassment. She also called our attention to the **Angel Tree** donation cards on our tables.

She rang the Rotary Bell, blushed, then led us in the Four-Way Test before releasing us at 1:06.


