Alex led us in a stir-


less rendition of Happy

Mary Jo Dean introduced the Founder and Chairman of MY POSSIBILITIES, Charmaine



On a more personal level, I am an active church member. I believe in being an active community member and enjoy making a difference in the lives of children and adults with disabilities in the Plano community. I have been an active CASA volunteer for more than 8 years, as well as one of the founding members of MY POSSIBILITIES. MY POSSIBILITIES is a continuing education, adult day program for adults with special needs in Collin County

Charmaine began by explaining that MY POSSIBILITIES is "meeting the needs of so many HIPsters," an acronym she promised to address later and did. (Hugely Important Persons, really?) She introduced us to "several new programs," which we had the "opportunity" to support. She introduced herself as "Kule's mother," referring to her spe-



Seeking out other mothers of special needs children, she asked, "What do you do?" She created an organization of such mothers and was gratified and surprised when "100s of people showed up." It was a DIY project, but they first had to locate a rental location which was difficult given the prejudice against the challenged. Finally a landlord with a special needs daughter was found and the group located to a Custer Road venue.

The next challenge was financing, so \$200K Bake Sales later, they enrolled their first 10 students...and it's "growth is now exponential." It would have to be to serve the $\frac{1}{4}$ million in the nation. So prevalent are they that $\frac{1}{3}$ of everyone knows at least someone with a special needs

child or adult. MY POSSIBILITIES benefits not only the students but also their families by permitting caregivers to go to work worry-free.

MP has purchased property near Coit and Independence and must move in by April 2018 as they have outgrown the current facility.

MP teaches Lifelong Learning Skills including educational, social, and financial. They take the time to "find out what they want" rather than telling their clients what to do. Some focus on musical skills; one was found to have perfect pitch. It's that sort of thing that "changes your life when exposed to them." The organization is "the first of its kind in the U.S.," and its expansion requires \$25M, 15 of which has been secured.

Students become depressed when they leave the security of high school "until they make friends at MY POSSIBILITIES." And MP serves 500 kids every week. It could not continue without the many volunteers (check out the unending staff list online) and donors. For their clients, it engenders thoughts of "This is where I belong, where my community embraces me."

Mary Jo asked Charmaine to share what kind of jobs her clients can do. She told us

- Hospitality industry
- Catering
- Restaurants
- Janitorial services

And one issue is that the employers must be trained in "how to work with special needs workers."

Alex asked if MP is similar to *Mosaic*. He was told that they have a similar therapy program and they cooperate with MP to transfer clients.

Olin Jaye asked how MP is funded. Charmaine said that it has a Gala, a Golf Tournament, and a 5K Run raising \$1.2M. It gets grants from *United Way* and foundations. And the Culinary Department is selfsustaining.

President Horne gave her the multiport charger, reminded us of the DG's visit next week and the Board meeting at 10 then, led us in the 4-Way Test, and belled us out at 12:54.


