SPIRITWARE Feigenbaum introduced the speaker.

Darren Collins is a member of the *DeSoto Rotary Club*. He has been spearheading a global grant on behalf of district 5810 which teaches HIV/AIDS EDUCATION in East Africa. The program uses puppetry as a vehicle for social change within schools all around Nairobi, Kenya. Darren is on hiatus from the project and returns to Kenya at the end of the month. Darren announced that he was returning to let us know how he spent our money! His efforts at stemming the HIV-AIDS epidemic in Africa through education are funded by grants from 5810 as well as the Nairobi, DeSoto, and Plano Rotaries in the amount of \$35K.

What he does is a combination of a school assembly and vacation Bible school. Through puppeteering and magic, he lets kids and adults know how AIDS is and isn't transmitted between people.

AIDS is, of course, a medical problem, but it's so misunderstood in Africa that it's a social problem as well. Even getting yourself checked at a clinic is stigmatizing since clinics are seen as WHERE YOU GO TO GET AIDS! So Darren has researched the social aspect in Kenya with church and school leaders, some of whom are critically ignorant about the issues. Nevertheless, he has compiled a list of what the misconceptions are and has thus prepared a curriculum for what folks need to know.

He submitted the curriculum to the group that writes the *McGruff the Dog* scripts. Their output was funneled to a screen writer, whose credits include *The Secret Lives of Dogs and Cats*. The anthropomorphic critter play that resulted was sent to Kenya to be edited into Swahili then prerecorded by local voice personalities in East Africa.

Darren played a three-minute video of the project's influence. It featured catchy music and portions of the play seen by adoring children (and their teachers). "Education is their way forward," the video contends, saying that, in addition to the performance, the children take home a booklet for their parents.

While he respects the Four-Way Test, the problem in developing countries is "They don't say the bad stuff," so problems fester rather than being solved. And, in an adroit segue, he listed a litany of problems that faced him on his last visit to Nairobi. He and his team spent 11 weeks, using one vehicle to reach 17,800 students and adults.

After an orientation meeting, his friend and

helpmate, **Helen**, died in a swimming pool as a result of undiagnosed anemia. Unaware of local customs, Darren was nearly arrested for "early burial." The black cloud expanded when his host family was involved in a car accident, and another five friends died!



On top of that, record rainfall necessitated hiring a contractor to fix his house back in the States. He chose his renter, who promptly took the cash and bailed.

And in Nairobi, the police "riddled my office with bullets" in their efforts to catch a thief. Thankfully, no one was injured; that goes for the crook too.

Darren is most concerned about the children born with AIDS. They are discriminated against through no fault of their own. So the script has been rewritten to include "talk about respect."

His project has become a victim of its own success. *Doctors Without Borders "sent a spy"* to his performances and ended up contracting him to create another puppet theater about gender-based violence. *Hand Up*, his nonprofit company, is considering kidnapping as a tutorial subject as well.

Then came the pitch. It costs **\$85** to put on a school performance (mostly salaries for the puppeteers) and an additional **\$43** to produce the literature that they distribute. What he really needs is sustained, monthly support that will permit him to forgo seeking big, episodic grants. Darren is an advocate of "2nd Giving." 1st giving is to the local community. 2nd is for international projects.

He tried to impress upon us that Third World problems are in our national interests to solve. The example he gave was the Ebola Crisis that shut down international flights and tanked airline stocks. So "it's all related."

Lenny asked why he worked in Kenya. What's the "*ultimate impact*?" Darren told him that he has been invited to work elsewhere, South Sudan, for example. (So he's a glutton for terrorist punishment.)

Jamie Schell reiterated Lenny's question, "Why Kenya?" The answer is that he was invited there, and it's a "hub of talent." AIDS is worse in West Africa, however.

John Caldwell asked about the crushing expense of AIDS medication. Darren said that that's a problem for developed countries. In Kenya, it's free for most individuals.

Ean asked about the mischievous baboons. Darren said that you can't have an outdoor barbecue because they swarm the place, stealing the best parts. It's so bad that Darren "shops at night when the baboons are asleep!"

David presented Darren with our Non-Perpetual Desk Organizers, cautioning him to keep it away from the baboons. Kelly Palmer announced a Foundation Board Meeting to follow lunch. David led us in the Four-Way Test and belled us out exactly on time.
