She lauded the acts of heroism performed by "ordinary citizens under extraordinary circumstances." SPIRITWARE Feigenbaum introduced Jim Gatewood, a Dallas History professor at *Richland College* and best selling Dallas author, who has spent the last eleven years with the Dallas County Assassination Review Board. In his quest he has rediscovered much of the forgotten history of Dallas' most prominent figures who would leave their mark upon America's History. He has written books about notable figures of Dallas, Texas; Benny Binion, Dallas Gambler and Mob boss - Sheriff Bill Decker a Texas legend - J. Frank Norris - Top O' Hill Casino & The Texas Oil Rich - The Ku Klux Klan's stronghold over Dallas - Slats Rodgers and the Love Field Lunatics - Bonnie Parker's Baby Daughter - Captain Will Fritz and the Dallas Mafia and learn that the JFK's Assassination Was a Mafia Hit.

Jim told the tale of "Lone Wolf" Gonzaullas and the Assassination of Pancho Villa. And he told it as he tells all of his Dallas tales, as if he knew each character personally! Since Gonzaullas died in '77, he may well have!!

Manuel Trazazas Gonzaullas, "Manny T." or "Lone Wolf" to Jim, was born in Cadiz to a

Hispanic father and German mother. He showed early interest in firearms, being sat behind a water-cooled machine gun at a tender age. His father was instrumental in securing a Mexican land grant for the Commanding General of the Northern



Army, so the General became Manny's godfather. The ranch was ideal as it had a silver mine associated with it, so it was very attractive to banditos. One fall night, Pancho Villa raided the ranch, and as Manny hid, he watched Villa torture his brothers to death for the location of the silver, all the while singing the Villa marching song, La Cucaracha (the Cockroach). His parents, away in Chihuahua at the time, returned to find Manny swearing revenge upon Pancho Villa.



The family moved to Galveston, where the parents were promptly killed in the deadliest hurricane to hit the US. Manny was only 11 in 1900, but the hurricane put him on his own. He railed at God over his misfortune until it came to

him that he was saved from death for a purpose...to slay Villa. So he went about picking up the skills necessary for the job.

As a 5' 8" 155# weakling, he was bullied unmercifully until a cook, Roy Stuart, from Scotland, coached him in boxing. Thereafter, bullies left him alone. A fencing master from Czarist Russia taught him that art, and Manny learned to become an ambidextrous fighter, earning a trophy for his fencing.


Taken in by the King Ranch family, he exercised horses and learned to shoot from the hip with pistols until he never missed. He sought work on Post Office Street in Galveston and was mistaken for a Mexican. A gang of Anglos were about to pulverize him when a burly pair of AT&T linemen intervened, insisting on a one-on-one fight. Manny polished off the first and asked, "What fool is next?"

The linemen adopted Manny as their "tool pusher," but actually for his penchant to get into fights that they'd finish. Hearing La Cucaracha in a tavern one evening, Manny killed the three Mexicans singing Villa's song. Predictably, he was tossed in the clink, but a minister friend was buddies with the Chief of Police who was himself the classmate of the magistrate trying Manny's case. So he was exiled to China on a mission for the church.

Stopping in at Don Luis' ranch, he acquired a pair of double-action revolvers and a saber which served him well in the Boxer Rebellion into which he was thrust in China! In one skirmish, he was wounded and would have bled to death had not a contingent of Marines rescued him and returned him to Mexico.

There, Don Luis tasked him to kill Villa and rescue Don Luis' kidnapped son. knocked off 152(!) of Villa's gang but not Pancho himself.

Applying to the Texas Rangers, he was rejected as too small and unintimidating until a Captain tossed a



He organized the assassination of Villa, shooting him from the roof of a furniture store where he'd come to retrieve a shipment. Manny severed his head and returned it to Don Luis as proof. At this point, Jim hawked his books and received our fabled desk organizer for his efforts.

Jerry Kezhaya touted the (last) Tuesday night outing at **Fleming's**, Dave led us in the Four-Way Test and dismissed us at 1:02.
