HE WARREN COMMISSION declared Oswald to be the lone assassin. But before it had finished its work, Supreme Court Justice Earl Warren made a curious comment: "We may not know the whole story in our lifetime." But that just encouraged 82% of Americans to make up their own.



Announcement exhausted, he called David McWhorter to introduce the day's speaker, Stephen Fagin, Associate Curator and Oral Historian for the 6th Floor Museum at Dealey Plaza.



Since 2000, he has managed the museum's ongoing Oral History Project and contributed to collections, exhibitions, education, and programming initiatives. He is the author of Assassination and Commemoration published in 2013 and an American History magazine biography of Lee Harvey Oswald. Mr. Fagin holds degrees from SMU and OU.

Mr. Fagin's program, based on his new book, explores the long-term impact of the assassi-

nation of **President John F. Kennedy**, and details the

history and development of the 6th Floor Museum at Dealey Plaza.

Stephen announced what his talk was (prepared for the 50th anniversary of the assassination) and what it was not (a nod to conspiracy theories). He told us that he would "concentrate on the effects of the assassination" on the City of Dallas. And he pronounced those to be "profound effect(s) on people around



the world." In the days following the deed, Dealey Plaza became a shrine, and there were calls to demolish the Tex-

as School Book Depository.



Dallas was viewed by the rest of the country as extremist, abetted by the likes of General **Edwin Walker** and the *John Birch Society*, which had its headquarters here. The assassination confirmed the world's opinion in that regard: <u>Dallas</u> had killed the President. The *Saturday Evening*

Post ran an editorial speaking of the shame of Dallas. The criticism was international.



The City put up a bronze marker on Dealey Plaza and erected the *Open Tomb*, dedicated in 1970. But the School Book Depository remained "a birthmark on your child's face," said **Blackie Sherrod**, something you can live with until a stranger's remarks bring it into focus. He went on to say that it was a "day and a shadow that will never be erased from memory."

In 1970, music producer **Aubrey Mayhew** purchased the Depository out of an abiding interest in Kennedy memorabilia, hoping to make a commercial go of it, but the wounds were still too fresh. The State of Texas had no interest in it. Prominent citizens like **Tom Landry** and **Ross Perot** wanted it expunged, but **Mayor Wes Wise** put a hold on any demolition plans. Finally, Dallas County took it over as its Administration Building, placing a historical marker at the site.

Serious preservation began with **Lindalyn Adams**, President of the *Dallas County Historical Foundation*, and **Conover Hunt**, its Project Director. They surveyed Dealey Plaza visitors and discovered that 100% of them were interested in the 6th floor of the Depository. The project was delayed by several factors: the failure of the National Park Service to recognize it as a historical landmark, the assassination attempt on **President Reagan** by **John Hinckley**, **Jr.**, who was obsessed with Oswald and Kennedy's assassination, an arson attempt during the Republican Convention (and by archeologists bent on surveying the site of the museum's proposed external elevator as being the only undisturbed plot in the City. From it, they discovered that reactionary Dallas was originally an integrated community!).

Dismissing worries that the 6th Floor Museum would glorify Oswald and further embarrass Dallas, County Judge Lee Jackson supplied the funds and construction began in the spring of 1988. A planned parking garage and subway station had to be quashed before the museum opened on 20 February 1989 to mostly positive reviews.

The Dallas Horning Pews headline read TODAY WE STAND WHOLE AGAIN.

2/3 of the patrons at the opening had personal memories of that day in 1963. Today only 1/3 do. Historical panels lead chronologically to the **5niper'5 Ne5t**, but the organization of its approach leads to chaos on its departure. Multiple exits suggest confusion after the event. Only one alcove in the exhibit is devoted (though perhaps that is not the right word) to Oswald and Ruby.



By 1992, it had attracted its 1 millionth visitor. It is an education site housing 45,000 articles and 1,100 oral history interviews.

At this point, he threw the meeting open for questions, the first of which, from Paul Huang, was more of a statement, asserting that everyone should have been prepared for security breaches in Dallas. Whose responsibility was it to clear the building before the

President passed, he wanted to know. Stephen asked whether Paul thinks the conspiracy involved the government itself. Paul said, "The government needs to answer the ques-Stephen acknowltion." edged that nothing polarizes



a discussion like competing conspiracy theories, and that's why he doesn't take a position on who was responsible and why they acted. The Museum permits attendees to come to their own conclusions. He added that "the view out the window validates all opinions;" there are those who believe they could have "hit the President with a football," and those who believe the shot was impossible without coconspirators elsewhere around Dealey.

John Caldwell asked about preparations for the anniversary. Stephen said that the City will commemorate the event for the first time. Historian David McCullough will speak. The Dallas Museum of Art will host an exhibit. The 6th Floor Museum will organize new material on the 7th Floor. He directed us to YouTube® for recordings of oral histories.

It being 1:01, Sainted Editor rudely pointed to his (watchless) wrist, and Stephen said, "I see

that I'm out of time," and graciously condlu ed. KIRK noted that Plano Rotary has paid the Curator the highest compliment. "It's a ter 1, and no one has left!"
