A Rotary Story

As you know, nearly 20 of our members attended the District Conference last weekend, and another ten including four members of our SHS Interact Club, came to accept the three awards that we received. I felt so honored and proud of our Club that I asked our members to tell me what inspired them the most, or just simply what they liked best. The following is what Bob Ashley put to paper.

The best part of the conference was the power of Rotary. I will tell you a story. The two Masai tribesmen spoke and I thought they were interesting. I was somewhat familiar with their culture as I had visited a Masai village in 1969. I knew that they drank blood from cattle mixed with the milk from the cattle. When the Chief showed his wife and four kids standing in front of his hut, I knew that the hut was made out of small branches covered with cow dung. So, a bit later I saw John, not Chief Joseph, in the House of Friendship and we talked. You might remember that the chief said that there was no well in his village. I asked John where they got their water and he said the women walk 10 miles and bring water back with a donkey. He said they got it from a pond filled with rain water. I asked if it was good water (already knowing the answer) and he replied that no it was bad water and everyone was sick on a regular basis. As we know, I work with water and had heard this story many times. So, I said, okay John come over to this water filter display that the Rotary Club of Somewhere had set up and let me show you something. By now the House of Friendship was empty except for John and I. I was going to be late to lunch and John was checking out shortly. I showed him the Sawyer Water Filter and explained how it works. I explained that if he had one of the filters his family and many others would have clean water for many, many years. I quickly explained how to assemble the filter and that it would produce about 500 liters of clean water a day. The water would go in mixed with cow dung and come out cleaner than the water we drink in America. He was quickly interested, probably one more unbelievable thing he saw on his trip to America, as he stood there in his tribal dress of brightly colored wrap around with his very ornate gold necklace. So, I said, tell you what, I will get you two of these filters. I will arrange for the Castle Rock Rotary, noon club, who was his sponsor to get him the filters. He seemed pleased and we each headed out separate ways. So then with a little checking around, I found another group in the House of Friendship close to my own location there called Global Social and Sustainable Enterprise MBA program from CSU. So it turns out Shannon Scott will be going to Johns Village in June and I explained it to her, showed her the filter, and she agreed to take two filters with her for John and Chief Joe. So, there you go, the power of Rotary. Obviously I cannot afford to buy everyone in the developing world a filter, but I can afford to buy two. The Rotary Connection.
