LAST TUESDAY AT ROTARY - President Jen Wewers opened the meeting and led members in the Pledge of Allegiance, and Dan Duncan provided the invocation. Once again, we were joined by Fernanda Tomé, President of the Rotaract Club of Western Kansas City, and Melody Burns, a VISTA member in the UG's Department of Planning and Urban Design.

**Todd Jordan**, program chair for the day, introduced our speaker, **Michele Surber**, Regional Executive Director of Caritas Clinics -Kansas. A Rotarian from the Lee's Summit Rotary Club #6040, Ms. Surber expressed her delight on being able to visit with and present to our Club. Ms. Surber has been with Caritas Clinics since April of 2021, shadowing the prior Executive Director for a couple of months prior to formally assuming the leadership role in June. Prior to joining Caritas Clinics, Ms. Surber served as Regional Director of Operations at Telecare Corporation in Alameda, California and as an administrator for the Ventura County Health Care Agency.

Caritas Clinics operates the Duchesne Clinic in Kansas City, Kansas, as well as the St. Vincent Clinic in Leavenworth and the Marian Dental Clinic in Topeka. As Executive Director of these three facilities, Ms. Surber's goal is to provide pointed or targeted care to individuals in need in the clinics' service areas. She emphasized the importance of focusing on programs designed to address the specific needs of the community rather than providing a standard "one size fits all" health care program.

Future plans for the clinics include adding services in behavioral health care, expanding the patient base to include children, adding dental services at Duchesne and St. Vincent, and enhancing outreach efforts.

While continuing to work with Wyandot Behavioral Health Network, the clinics plan to begin providing enhanced behavioral health care services in addition to the primary health care services which have been the core of the clinics' ministry for years. Also, the addition of Marian Dental Clinic to the Caritas Clinics operations will allow for dental services to be provided at both Duchesne Clinic and St. Vincent Clinic, initially through use of a mobile dental unit.

In an effort to locate funding for the expanded services, Caritas Clinics will be applying for two HRSA grants later this month. One grant application seeks funding to enhance efforts and programs for employee resiliency and the second grant application requests funds for expanded training and residency programs within the clinics.

At present, the health care providers at Duchesne and St. Vincent clinics see in the range of 1200-1300 patients each year. Regrettably, an estimated 9,000-10,000 individuals in Wyandotte and Leavenworth counties lack health care insurance, suggesting that many more persons in our area need access to non-emergency health care services. With this statistic in mind, plans are also underway to conduct renovations at both Duchesne and St. Vincent to expand patient care spaces to allow for increased patient load as well as to include dental operatories at both buildings.

Where the Gate to Kansas Swings Open

The Kansas City, Kansas Rotary Club was organized on November 2, 1915, and received its charter as Club No. 195 in January 1916. Its members take pride in more than 100 years of Rotary service to the community and to international fellowship. From this Club have come five District Governors and two Directors of Rotary International. The Club's history is as rich as that of the community it represents.

Following the Lewis and Clark expedition which camped at the confluence of the Kansas and Missouri rivers on June 26, 1804, in present day Kansas City, Kansas, this area became an important center for fur trappers. In the following years, many Indian tribes were relocated here from the East. In 1842 the Wyandot Indians acquired land here and founded a town. During this period, and for the next five decades, this area became the main gateway to the inviting majesty of the sprawling Kansas Prairie and the American West. This was where the frontier began. Pioneers found river transportation, outfitters, and the beginning of the Santa Fe and Oregon Trails. After the covered wagons, came major trunk railroads and barge lines.

In 1886, Kansas City, Kansas received its charter as an incorporated city, combining the towns of Wyandot, Argentine, and Armourdale. (Rosedale was added in 1922.) Kansas City, Kansas is the site of the first industrial park in the United States, home of the prestigious University of Kansas Medical Center, and the location of the National Agricultural Hall of Fame and of the nationally recognized Kansas Speedway.

Near the geographical and population centers of the contiguous United States, Kansas City, Kansas is in the temperate latitudes at an elevation of 726 feet above sea level. The average rainfall is 35 inches. The average mean temperature ranges from  $30^{\circ}$  F in January to  $80^{\circ}$  F in July. The lowest recorded temperature was -23° F on December 23, 1989, and the highest was 113° F on August 14, 1936. Our city's population of 145,000 and area of 155 square miles rank it 158th among cities in the United States.
