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LAST TUESDAY AT ROTARY - President Jen Wewers opened the meeting and led members in the Pledge of Allegiance. Karen Hostetler provided the invocation, a prayer for peace, which was delivered by President Jen, to accommodate Zoom considerations. Scott Kaufmann then led Club members in singing "R-O-T-A-R-Y".

Mark Dupree introduced our speaker, Moses Wyatt, Jr., Founder/CEO of The Jegna Klub, and a Behavior Intervention Specialist at Grant Elementary School. A current KCK resident who was born and raised in Wyandotte County, Mr. Wyatt has also recently been appointed as the Youth Advocate Liaison to Mayor Garner's office. Mr. Wyatt's career in education began with his desire to coach, and he has coached school and amateur sports both basketball and football - for 24 years. Over the years, Coach Wyatt has realized that his passion includes coaching youth in life as well as in sports.

The Jegna Klub is a recognized 501(c)(3) non-profit organization formed to help build youth for the future. Coach Wyatt adopts the philosophy voiced by Franklin D. Roosevelt that "[w]e cannot always build the future for our youth, but we can build our youth for the future." Presenting youth with positive role models allows young people to envision a future that may extend beyond their own family, neighborhood, and personal experience. If young people don't see successful adults, they have a difficult path to becoming successful adults. Citing a recent survey of grade school students, Coach Wyatt reported that 97% of those students responded that they believed they would be in the exact same place as their parents, some of whom were unemployed or incarcerated. The Jegna Klub works to break this cycle by providing youth with hope and opportunity. The five basic pillars of The Jegna Klub are:

- Relationship building and networking
- Character development
- Social skills
- Financial literacy
- Career exploration

Coach Wyatt emphasized that relationship building is the first pillar because he views it as the key to a productive future. Everyone needs people around them to serve as a support network. The focus on character development and social skills provides young people with practical life skills to add to their book knowledge to help them thrive in the work world.



Serving the Youth as Advocate Liaison to the office affords Mayor's Wyatt Coach the opportunity to expand on his current work and advise Mayor Garner on ideas for getting and keeping young people engaged in their community, giving a voice to the youth in our community.

Coach Wyatt truly shows his passion and clearly lives true to his guiding principle of leaving a place better than he found it.


During February, we were joined by several other inspirational speakers. Here is a look back at February -

Where the Gate to Kansas Swings Open

The Kansas City, Kansas Rotary Club was organized on November 2, 1915, and received its charter as Club No. 195 in January 1916. Its members take pride in more than 100 years of Rotary service to the community and to international fellowship. From this Club have come five District Governors and two Directors of Rotary International. The Club's history is as rich as that of the community it represents.

Following the Lewis and Clark expedition which camped at the confluence of the Kansas and Missouri rivers on June 26, 1804, in present day Kansas City, Kansas, this area became an important center for fur trappers. In the following years, many Indian tribes were relocated here from the East. In 1842 the Wyandot Indians acquired land here and founded a town. During this period, and for the next five decades, this area became the main gateway to the inviting majesty of the sprawling Kansas Prairie and the American West. This was where the frontier began. Pioneers found river transportation, outfitters, and the beginning of the Santa Fe and Oregon Trails. After the covered wagons, came major trunk railroads and barge lines.

In 1886, Kansas City, Kansas received its charter as an incorporated city, combining the towns of Wyandot, Argentine, and Armourdale. (Rosedale was added in 1922.) Kansas City, Kansas is the site of the first industrial park in the United States, home of the prestigious University of Kansas Medical Center, and the location of the National Agricultural Hall of Fame and of the nationally recognized Kansas Speedway.

Near the geographical and population centers of the contiguous United States, Kansas City, Kansas is in the temperate latitudes at an elevation of 726 feet above sea level. The average rainfall is 35 inches. The average mean temperature ranges from  $30^{\circ}$  F in January to  $80^{\circ}$  F in July. The lowest recorded temperature was -23° F on December 23, 1989, and the highest was 113° F on August 14, 1936. Our city's population of 145,000 and area of 155 square miles rank it 158th among cities in the United States.
