### Lincoln East Rotary Club 5th Wednesday "Special Event" Wednesday, July 31, 2019 5:00 pm Dinner; 6:00 pm Tour

Lincoln East Rotary Club will be touring the home of William Jennings Bryan (Fairview) on July 31, 2019. We will not have our usual NOON meeting, instead meet at Bryan Health at 5:00 pm and eat dinner in the cafeteria. Those who wish not to join us for dinner, may meet us at the home for the Tour. Parking, Garage A.

The Williams Jennings Bryan House is located near the southeast corner of the Bryan Health campus, on the north side of Sumner Street opposite South 50th Street, 4900 Sumner St. The house is a brick building, 1-1/2 stories in height, with a combination of Classical Revival and Queen Anne Victorian styling. It has the varied rooflines typical of the latter style, including a two-story square turret at the right front corner, topped by a slightly bell cast pyramidal roof with flared edges. Window sizes and shapes are also varied, with a small Palladian window in one gable section, and a larger one on the second level of the tower. The house was built in 1902 to a design by Artemus A. Roberts, and is



a high-quality example of what was at the time a popular style in Lincoln. It was built for Williams Jennings Bryan, a Democratic Party politician then at the height of is influence. He was three times an unsuccessful candidate for President of the United States (in 1896, 1900, and 1908), and gave the influential Cross of Gold speech to the 1896 Democratic Party convention. The house served Bryan as both a private and public space. He hosted numerous gatherings, including political rallies and other public events, and also hosted prominent political figures of the day.



**William Jennings Bryan** (March 19, 1860 – July 26, 1925) was an American orator and politician from Nebraska. Beginning in 1896, he emerged as a dominant force in the Democratic Party, standing three times as the party's nominee for <u>President of the United States</u>. He also served in the United States House of Representatives and as the United States Secretary of State under Woodrow Wilson. Just before his death, he gained national attention for attacking the teaching of evolution in the Scopes Trial. Because of his faith in the wisdom of the common people, he was often called "The Great Commoner". Born and raised in Illinois, Bryan moved to Nebraska in the 1880s. He won election to the House of Representatives in the 1890 elections, serving two terms before making an unsuccessful run for the Senate in 1894. At the 1896 Democratic National Convention, Bryan delivered his "Cross of Gold speech" which attacked the gold standard and the eastern moneyed interests and crusaded for inflationary policies built around the expanded coinage of silver coins. In a repudiation of incumbent

President Grover Cleveland and his conservative Bourbon Democrats, the Democratic convention nominated Bryan for president, making Bryan the youngest major party presidential nominee in U.S. history. Subsequently, Bryan was also nominated for president by the left-wing Populist Party and many Populists would eventually follow intensely fought 1896 Bryan into the Democratic Party. In the presidential election, Republican nominee William McKinley emerged triumphant. Bryan gained fame as an orator, as he invented the national stumping tour when he reached an audience of 5 million people in 27 states in 1896.

#### **Signal Optimization Program**

- Implement cyclical signal optimization program enabling primary arterials to be retimed every 3-5 years.
- Evaluate and install updated signal phasing hardware (Flashing Yellow Arrow) at all required protected/ permitted left-turn locations.
- Develop City of Lincoln standard traffic signal optimization guidelines for internal and consultant use on signal timing projects.

#### **Flashing Yellow Lights:**

A flashing yellow arrow signal means turns may proceed with caution **after yielding to oncoming traffic**. A flashing yellow arrow may apply to both left and right turn movements. When turning left on a flashing yellow arrow, drivers **must yield** to oncoming traffic and pedestrians in the crosswalk before turning.
