Karen grew up in Cairo, NE, graduating from Centura High School, Doane College and Southeast Community College. She worked in Public Relations, Restaurant Management, Banking and Human Resources before landing a job in the Securities Industry, where she spent about 15 years. In 1996, she entered the ministry, and have served churches in Greenwood, Alvo, Pleasant Dale, and Denton. Karen is currently serving the United Methodist churches in Douglas and Burr. My husband Bob and I have been married for 29 years, and between us we have three daughters, three son in laws, and two grandchildren. In 2014, she entered into a partnership with Terrie Urtel, and we opened LuLu's at 48th and Cornhusker. We moved downtown in 2016 and moved to our current location in May of 2017. Karen has been the sole owner of LuLu's since December of 2018. It was after my second partner left the business that she decided to take the leap of faith and start feeding all who asked, regardless of ability to pay. We have since formed a non profit to enable us to seek grant funds.

She's using an ice cream scoop to make balls of cookie dough, oatmeal scotchies on their way to the oven. A pot of vegetable beef simmers on a two-burner stove. The street is empty. Lamb wears a baseball cap and blue jeans and a chef's apron. The 57-year-old does some catering, too. She works part-time at an insurance office and on Sundays she preaches at United Methodist churches in Burr and Douglas. She became a minister in mid-life.

"I've always been interested in feeding people." Last week, she reached out for help with Community Meals after her funds ran dry. Her plea brought in \$100, enough for 20 meals. Those 20 tickets are gone. More money came in Tuesday, after her face appeared on the local TV news. She posted her gratitude on Facebook and put out a call to federal employees in Lincoln to come by for a free lunch. When the money is gone, she'll keep giv-

ing. She can't turn people away, Lamb says. "I have a hard time saying no. Friday, I fed more homeless people than paying customers." And the woman behind Lulu's on N has a plan. She'd like to turn the restaurant into a pay-asyou-can place and she's figuring out how to make her business a nonprofit. She envisions grants and a small job training program for people who need a boost, a way to get into the working world. "I want to talk to other restaurant owners, find out what their needs are," she says.

Then get future workers in her small kitchen to learn the tricks of the cooking trade, help them get food handler permits, the right clothes. "Most importantly, buy them shoes with nonslip soles." She's serious about that, says the apron-wearing preacher. A good woman with a motto: *Feeding hungry bodies and nourishing souls.* (*Excerpts from article in Lincoln Journal Star*)

Mark is currently the Chairperson for the Veterans Memorial Garden Advisory Council. I spent 28 years in the Air Force with most of it full time at the Nebraska Air Guard. I then worked for 15 years at the Arbor Day Foundation in the IT Department repairing computers and doing infrastructure, and networking. I am a second generation with the Vet Council after taking over for my dad and have been with this group for approximately 14 years.

The Veteran's Memorial Garden Advisory Council was formed to recommend policy on issues relating to the development, design, programming and preservation of the Garden area and all memorials contained in the Garden. The Council is comprised of mayoral appointed members committed to creating a place and promoting events to honor all veterans and their families, past and present. Through the Council, an endowment account has been established to help maintain the Garden.

- Inspired by the traveling Vietnam Memorial Wall that visited Lincoln in 1989 and the outpouring of support after the military success in the Persian Gulf War in 1991
- Officially dedicated in June 1993
- Star in center has five points that point to 5 conflicts: World War I, World War II, Vietnam War, Korean War, and Family.
- Lady Liberty will be relocated this year to the center of the star
- Currently, there are 25 total memorials and monuments

Bricks of Honor:

- There are over 5000 engraved bricks honoring Veterans in the Garden.
- Veterans, living or deceased, who have received an Honorable or General Discharge, may be honored with an engraved brick.
- A directory at the entrance and on-line lists the veteran name and a guide to the location of the brick.

Veterans Garden Events

- Memorial Day
- Brick of Honor Dedication
- Patriots Day
- Veterans Day
- Pearl Harbor Day

Events begin at 11 am and are in the Garden, weather permitting, otherwise held in Auld Pavilion.
