MY EXCHANGE JOURNEY



Before the Rotary Vocational Exchange Program, I was at a crossroads, seeking clarity about my purpose. My Rotaract presidency had ended on a high note, with remarkable projects earning recognition nationally and internationally. Professionally, I was engaged with the World Bank, contributing to Nepal's first-ever IDA 21 Replenishment Meeting. Life seemed perfect—prestige, professional success, and family pride.

Yet, a conversation with Suzanne, my manager during the IDA meeting, shifted my perspective. Her words, "Ajay, don't settle for comfort or let anyone consume your energy or anything," made me realize I was at risk of losing my essence—the part of me that finds fulfillment in stories and smiles. Determined to regain clarity, I attended a 10-day Vipassana retreat, which helped me reflect and approach the exchange program with renewed focus.

Collaborating with Sally Armstrong, Jenny Foster, and David Gorman, we designed the program to explore three key areas: peacebuilding, economic empowerment, and youth engagement. These themes resonate deeply with me—peacebuilding reflects my spiritual inclination and love for meditation, economic empowerment stems from my experiences with poverty and professional insights, and youth engagement aligns with my passion for energizing Nepal's young generation. Despite challenges in securing resources and host organizations, persistence led to a successful program design.

MY EXCHANGE JOURNEY

Over 10 weeks in Australia, I visited four states and engaged with inspiring individuals. This experience reaffirmed my belief that true transformation begins when people question societal assumptions and adopt a mindset of growth and collaboration. I see entrepreneurial education as a powerful means to achieve this vision, aligning perfectly with my life's purpose.

As I return to Nepal, I am excited to explore this approach and contribute to meaningful change. I am grateful to everyone who supported and guided me through this transformative journey.

EXCHANGE ENGAGEMENTS







Young Change Agents (YCA)

Young Change Agents, an Australian social enterprise promoting entrepreneurial education, hosted me during this exchange. Over 3 weeks, I engaged with their initiatives that focus on fostering innovation and critical thinking among youth.

• E3 Unconference (University of Tasmania):

- Attended a three-day event with 76 delegates from across the globe, exploring entrepreneurial education's potential to create classroom change agents.
- Participated in design thinking workshops and developed a deeper understanding of how experiential learning can cultivate a growth mindset, collaboration, and problemsolving skills.
- Connected with passionate educators and youth leaders, exchanging ideas to contextualize entrepreneurial education for Nepalese students.





After my time in Tasmania, I joined the team of Young Change Agents in Brisbane for an enriching experience. During the initial days, I had the privilege of being guided by Margaret, the CEO of Young Change Agents, who offered invaluable one-on-one mentorship. She shared insights into their programs and provided personalized guidance that helped deepen my understanding of entrepreneurial education.

Later, I collaborated with Cat, the COO of Young Change Agents, where we delved into their course curriculum and explored the potential for future collaborations. Together, we discussed ways to adapt their entrepreneurial learning hub for Nepal, focusing on expanding the movement of entrepreneurial education to empower young minds. This engagement strengthened my belief in the transformative power of experiential learning and opened doors for meaningful partnerships to bring this vision to life in Nepal.





illuminate Education Australia exists to have every young Australian invited to meaningfully address the biggest problems that matter to them now. To do so, they empower them to be confident, creative, and capable. Their programs and workshops do more than just teach business and entrepreneurial skills, they provide an opportunity for young people to develop a core set of skills and capacities they can use immediately in the program through to the rest of their lives. Spent 2 weeks with Illuminate to get hands-on experience in using design thinking as a tool to explore entrepreneurial education.

• Workshops in Gosford:

- Co-facilitated sessions with Adam Mostogl, empowering 200 students from 10 public schools to design solutions for aging populations using ideation, prototyping, and financial planning.
- Supported St. Edwards Boys School students during a fiveday design challenge, observing their journey from initial confusion to confident presentations.



RYPEN

Rotary's has made significant programs to support youth leadership development, and RYPEN is one of their notable programs. RYPEN is a weekend camp for young people aged 15 to 17 (Years 9-11), focused on helping them develop their potential through a mix of lectures and adventure-based learning. I was fortunate to attend RYPEN organized by District 9800 from October 25-27, where I had the chance to connect with young Australians.

I was impressed by their intelligence and dedication, which made the future of Australia look promising. On the other hand, I also learned about some challenges they face. For me, this experience was an opportunity to immerse myself in the vibrant energy of young minds. I served as a support member for a group, led short mindfulness activities, and observed some fantastic facilitation techniques by experts who incorporated storytelling, activities, and active participation. It was a truly rewarding experience.







<u>Space Melbourne</u> (formerly Illoura Peace Retreats) was established in 2016. With backgrounds working in the peace, development, security and community sectors on difficult topics and in difficult situations, Space Melbourne is no stranger to the darker sides of difficult work. With a history of managing the impact of difficult work on individuals, teams and organisations Space Melbourne is very alive to the common experiences of burnout, depression, grief, and other challenges.

Space Melbourne and Charles Allen

- Spent three transformative days with Charles Allen, co-founder of Space Melbourne and a Rotary Peace Fellow.
- Discussed experiential peacebuilding, explored tools like Haiku and Mirror exercises, and reflected on Positive Peace's pillars.
- Witnessed inclusive leadership in practice during a Rotary Club of Sydney meeting focused on the Reconciliation Action Plan.

- Observed efficient logistics and volunteer-driven efforts, reinforcing the value of resource redistribution in addressing local and global needs.




CAMBERWELL MARKET

PROJECT POSSIBILITY

Project Possibility is a two-month initiative to nurture entrepreneurial thinking in students. Through three phases—developing a mindset, learning Design Thinking and Social Enterprise, and pitching solutions—students learn to tackle challenges innovatively. Personalized mentorship refines their ideas, while pitching to stakeholders fosters confidence and ownership. The program empowers students to create meaningful change, balancing innovation with community impact.
