## Foundation Humanitarian Grants

The Rotary Foundation (TRF) has changed the rules regarding the expenditure/rolling over of unused DDF. Going forward, after 5 years unused DDF will automatically revert to the world fund and districts will lose it. Prior to money reverting to the world fund, districts will be invited to expend the funds on items such as polio or the peace centres. It is highly unlikely that D9800 be in this position as our DDF will be tracked very carefully and if not utilised by clubs will be donated to RI projects.

The D9800 **Annual Fund Share** this year was \$158,302 (= 50% of funds donated to TRF by D9800 individuals and clubs 3 years ago). The **Annual Fund Share** is then allocated to the following 2 areas.

1. The amount we will use for District Grants (Local and International) which is called the **Block Grant**. The Block Grant are the funds to be used for Local and International Grants and our Year 11-12 school scholarships. This year the block grant amount of US\$65k has been approved by TRF.
2. The remaining funds are used for Global Grants and RI projects. The following amounts have been allocated for the 22-23 Rotary Year
  - VTT Timor Leste D9560 \$5000
  - GECAF Rotavirus Kiribati \$10,000
  - Global Scholars (Hannah Gandy and Antonia Kent) - \$34,000
  - Polio Plus \$25,000
  - Peace centres (Peace Builder District) \$25,000
  - RAM Indonesia- \$7500
  - GECAF HPV Kiribati \$7500

Applications for grants remain a little slow compared to pre-pandemic numbers but are an improvement on last year so we expect clubs to increase their requests in the final 6 months of this 22-23 Rotary year. The Year 11-12 school scholarships have once again been well supported and fully expended again this year.

## The Rotary Foundation's Status

The Rotary Foundation again achieved Charity Navigator's highest rating of 4 stars, making this the 14th consecutive year The Rotary Foundation has achieved this rating. 91% of donations received goes to projects, making The Rotary Foundation one of the best value propositions for any donations one can make.

## End Polio Now update



As you would be aware Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years, and we have made incredible progress in the fight to rid the world of it forever. As a founding partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, Rotary has helped to reduced polio cases by more than 99.9% since the mid-1980s. It is crucial to eradicate polio from the last two countries where it remains endemic and to keep other countries polio-free.

If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyse as many as 200,000 children each year. **No place is safe until polio has been eradicated everywhere.**

The Global Polio Eradication Initiative is a public-private partnership led by national governments with six core partners - the World Health Organization (WHO), Rotary International, the US Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance. Its goal is to eradicate polio worldwide.

## WHO Wild Polio Virus Summary

At the end of 2022 there were 30 **Wild Polio Virus** cases with 2 in Afghanistan, 20 in Pakistan, and 8 in Mozambique.

- The total number of wild polio cases in 2021 were 6. There was 1 in Pakistan, 1 in Malawi, and 4 in Afghanistan.
- The total number of wild polio cases in 2020 were 140. There were 84 in Pakistan and 56 in Afghanistan

### Circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus (cVDPV) cases

- The total global cVDPV cases in 2022: 581
- Total global cVDPV cases in 2021: 698

There are 2 strains of Circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus (cVDPV1 and cVDPV2) with **most cases are caused by the Type 2 strain in the Oral Polio Vaccine (OPV)**. There has been recent developments to help combat this occurrence- see below for more details.

## nOPV2 rollout (NEW!)

**Novel oral polio vaccine, to combat the Type 2 strain of the vaccine derived polio (nOPV2) has been in use since 2021.** Approximately 525 million doses of nOPV2 have been administered across 25 countries. An additional 15 countries have met the requirements for nOPV2 use in the event of an outbreak. ## Polio Eradication Strategy 2022-26

**In exciting news** more than 3000 scientists and health experts from 115 countries met at the World Health summit in Berlin during October 2022 to discuss and validate plans for the eradication of Polio by 2026.

At this World Health Summit, USD 2.6 billion was pledged by various countries and philanthropic organizations to support the Polio Eradication Strategy 2022-26. Key donors included the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation (USD 1.2 billion), Rotary International (150 million) and the Australian Government (AUD 43.55 million).

The funding will support global efforts to overcome the final hurdles to polio eradication, vaccinate 370 million children annually over the next five years and continue disease surveillance across 50 countries.



- 1) **Goal One:** To permanently interrupt transmission of all poliovirus in Afghanistan and Pakistan by end of 2023 and certify them as polio free by end of 2026.
- 2) **Goal Two:** To stop transmission of circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus type 2 by end of 2023 and to prevent outbreaks in polio-free regions.

## Rotary Walk with Us End Polio

During the month of October, we once again held the Rotary Walk with Us to End Polio and for the third year had another successful campaign. Individuals and Teams walked over the entire month accumulating kilometres and raising funds for the End Polio Now campaign.

The overall result of \$55,511 was down on the previous 2 years but **the total over the 3 years is approximately \$300,000** (\$900,000 with the 2:1 match from the Gates Foundation).

There are also the added health benefits to those joining the campaign and raising awareness of Rotary efforts to eradicate Polio. There were 146 walkers and 26 teams. The 2022 leader board (top 12) for individual and team fundraising shows a diversity of Rotarians and clubs from across Australia and the world.

The inclusion of this event at future Zone conferences will be explored with the goal of making it a regular feature on the conference program. Incoming RI President Gordon McInally was also there for the start of the walk.



A very special mention to the team of Kitty O'Connor, Stephen Sennett, Murray Verso, Melissa McIntosh and yours truly who ensured the campaign ran smoothly once again.

Next year Jane Pennington is coming in as the District End Polio chair and has plans in place to ensure the campaign continues successfully.

I would like to thank Kitty who has been the chair for the past few years but is stepping down due to exciting work opportunities and other commitments.

### **Polio Plus Society (NEW!)**

The PolioPlus Society (PPS) is a new fundraising and recognition program that specifically supports PolioPlus. PPS encourages Rotary members and others to pledge at least US\$100 per year to the PolioPlus Fund until polio is eradicated from the face of the earth. Contributions will count toward Paul Harris Fellow recognition and Major Donor status and will be matched 2-to-1 by the Gates Foundation.

Rotary members and their friends who join the Society will be honoured with a distinctive lapel pin and a certificate, which will be presented at a special ceremony. The Society will be managed within D9800 by Jane Pennington.

### **Peace Bells for Melbourne (NEW!)**



Progress is being made on the installation of Peace Bells at Rotary Park Melbourne to coincide with the 2023 RI Convention in Melbourne. This project being led by Rob McGuirk for Melbourne Rotary and District 9800 and is also a legacy project for the RI Convention.

Promoting Peace is one of Rotary's 7 Areas of Focus and a cornerstone of Rotary's mission. The Peace Bells installation is designed to create a reflective, interactive, and informative experience to promote the importance of peace in all aspects of our lives.

The installation will consist of four bells designed and built by Assoc Prof Neil McLachlan who designed the Federation Bells (see <http://federationbells.com.au>) at Birrarung Marr, Melbourne.

Located adjacent to gate D of the Botanical Gardens in Rotary Park, each of the four bells would represent four steps everyone can take for peacebuilding.



- 1) To be at peace within themselves
- 2) To talk of the importance of peace for all people including First Nations peoples
- 3) To write messages of peace
- 4) To celebrate peace and International Day of Peace

The estimated budget for the bells and stands is \$120,000. Rotary International Convention committee and Rotary Melbourne have already committed \$30,000 each as well as contributions from D9800 and a few other Victorian Rotary Districts and other Rotary clubs.
