

FROM PRESIDENT DEBI BOUGHTON RE HIGH SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIPS:

Each year our Rotary Club gives two \$750 scholarships to two High School Seniors. The applications go to the school counselors in Kirksville, Brashear and Novinger School Districts. This year our club has selected Caleb Flaim and Elyse Johnson, both from the Kirksville R-III School District. Both students have excellent grades, high class rank, high ACT scores, and many activities.

Caleb Flaim really stood out to the selection committee because in this COVD19 crisis he designed and, using the school's 3D printer, made hundreds of face shields for local doctors and nurses to use. Caleb explains in his application, "I made sure the 3D printers at the Kirksville Area Technical Center were operating correctly. I optimized print speeds and quality as well as designed several face shields to be used in area hospitals." Caleb worked at least 100 hours in the past four weeks on this project.

Elyse Johnson has been a member of the Rotary Interact Club at the Kirksville High School since she was a sophomore. She served as Vice President and President of her Interact Club and helped plan the club's service projects. In her application Elyse says: "Our club went many places but by far my favorite was to the nursing home and I saw how my service could directly affect people. When we played bingo the best part was seeing the people's faces light up."

The future is in good hands with bright, service oriented young people like these two seniors. Congratulations to Caleb and Elyse.
