DISTRICT GRANT PROJECT: President Roy said the grant application deadline has been extended to August 15. As a possible project, Randy suggested creation of another soccer field in KLIFE's backyard. He said two goals would cost \$3,200 and four corner flags \$420. There is a sidewalk connecting the walking trail to KLIFE building which would allow access to Ray Miller students. President Roy said a sign there with Rotary wheel and "brought to you by Rotary" would be great. President Roy said he would be open to any other grant application ideas provided he receives them soon.

CLIMATE CHANGE AND INFECTIOUS DISEASES: Marie Murphree introduced Dr. Christine Harker, a Truman professor of English and Linguistics who has also chaired the university's Environmental Studies department. She is also a member of the Climate Reality Project. Dr. Harker said, within the last 40 years, almost all new infectious disease have been zoonoses, diseases which can be transmitted to humans from animals. She had several examples including Lyme disease from white-footed mice via ticks, West Nile disease from birds via mosquitoes and Ebola and AIDS from primates. Climate change with heat range changes and also habitat degradation increase the likelihood of these transmissions. She said some short term solutions include reducing the opportunity for zoonoses, eliminating trade in wild animals (suspected in COVID-19 transmission), protecting existing wild species and restoring damaged wild spaces.

Medium range goals including combatting climate change with global actions, reducing burning of fossil fuels and reforestation.
