ZAC ERWIN ON ECONOMIC IMPACT OF AGRICULTURE (IN MISSOURI AND ADAIR COUNTY)

Marie Murphree introduced Zac Erwin, a 2001 Adair County R-2 graduate, who earned his bachelor and master's degrees from Northwest Missouri State University in 2005 and 2006, respectively. In 2007, he became a Missouri Livestock Specialist for seven years in Lewis County before coming to Adair County where he is now involved in management. (He is pictured here in 2017 with his father, Rotarian David Erwin). Zac said in a 2016 study Missouri was a \$88 billion agriculture industry, \$55B in input alone on the farm level. It is second in the country, behind Texas on the number of farms and 3rd on beef cows. In a 2017 agriculture census, Adair County had 816 farms averaging 328 acres each for a total of a little more

than a quarter of a million acres. After his talk, Zac sought questions. Ralph asked if farmers are getting the benefit of the increase based in beef price at the store during the pandemic. Zac said no, it is the beef processors who have benefited. Four national companies control 85% of the market. Zac also said some ethanol production has been converted to grain alcohol due to the decrease in demand for ethanol during the COVID-19 pandemic.
