

Mr. Haggerty oversees the engineering of all rail, bus, and bus rapid transit projects at the San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG). He leads a core group of principal engineers and project managers who implement capital projects from initial funding to construction.

His responsibilities include: the identification of projects; initial scope and budget estimates; project manager assignments; tracking and directing projects from preliminary engineering through operation; selection and oversight of consultants; approval of plans and specifications; right-of-way acquisition; systems design; schedule development; project resource allocation; funding; in-

tergovernmental relations; and support during construction.

Currently, Mr. Haggerty is working on the Mid-Coast Corridor Transit Project, a \$1.7 billion extension of the San Diego Trolley system from Old Town to University City. At the same time, he's overseeing Trolley Renewal, a \$600 million program to rehabilitate tracks, overhead wires, and stations along the Trolley Orange, Green, and Blue lines.

Earlier in his career, he served as the principal engineer for two key Trolley projects: 1) *The Mis*sion Valley West Light Rail Transit Project to extend the Trolley 5.8 miles from Old Town to Qualcomm Stadium; 2) *The Mission* Valley East Light Rail Transit Project to extend the Trolley 5.6 miles through Mission Valley to La Mesa via an underground tunnel at San Diego State University. Mr. Haggerty also served as the project manager for the project that extended Trolley service to the City of Santee.

He has a bachelor's degree in civil engineering from California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo. A member of the American Society of Civil Engineers and the American Railway Engineering and Maintenance-of-Way Association, he resides in the City of San Diego and is married with two adult children.



aria and Antonio grew up in Puerto Rico and lived not less than 10 miles from each other. However, they never met on the island. It was not until their college days that they met while on vacation in St. Thomas. As happened to Al Pacino in the Godfather, Antonio felt as if struck by lightning! A year later they were married and a year later had their first (of three) sons, Tony. Antonio wanted a career in the US Air Force (fighter pilot) and entered an ROTC program. Nevertheless, he quit ROTC (a four year program) when given the opportunity to complete his bachelor's degree in three years. This was a good thing as Antonio is scared of heights. Antonio would have preferred an acting career but, hey, there's just so much you can do in a lifetime. Although he is no good as an artist, he finds painting (acrylics) therapeutic. He describes his style as beginners abstract, childish, primitive. He has not sold any paintings but has prevailed on a couple of friends to take some out of his hands.
