Sandi Rimer gave us an update on recent activities, including the updating of the club's website. We are hoping that the new website will help people learn more about our club and want to become more involved in what makes our club unique.

#### FOUNDATION

Steve Brown provided an overview of the Rotary Foundation, which provides financial support for Rotary International. Those who make a contribution of \$1,000 to the Rotary Foundation are recognized as Paul Harris Fellows. Contributions to the Rotary Foundation can be made on a recurring basis or in a lump sum. Contributions can also be made directly to our own La Jolla Golden Triangle Rotary Club Foundation. Funds donated to our club foundation are used to directly fund our own programs and endowments. Currently our club foundation contributes \$25,000 per year to support our local programs and events.

#### INTERNATIONAL SERVICE

**Steve Brown** also gave us an update on the International Service Committee, whose goal is to facilitate and promote international understanding, goodwill and peace.

#### YOUTH SERVICE

**Erik Mjoen** provided an update on the Youth Service Committee, whose goal is to help foster youth education and leadership development. Some examples of the committee's work include their work with the Model United Nations and our Interact and Rotoract Clubs. Other programs include the Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA), the Salk Mobile Science Lab, the Four Way Speech Contest, and the LEAD Program.

After all was said and done, **Dory Beatrice** reminded us that she counted 55 projects in which the club is involved and that she is not aware of any club that has the number of projects that we do. Another reminder that is the hard work of our members that truly makes us the most dynamic Rotary club in the world.

Barbro was born in Helsinki, Fin-

land at the end of World War II. She spent her childhood winters skiing and ice skating, summers fish-ing, sailing, and blueberry picking.

arbro attended French elementary school, and Swedish-speaking high school. Her dad, a family doc made clear to his daughters that they better get educated because he had no plans to support them. Barbro entered business school. Student debates and riots were sweeping Europe at the time, the Vietnam war a major target. A professor suggested Barbro run for the Helsinki City Council in 1968. She became the youngest member of the council at 21.

In 1971 she accepted a Masters Degree Scholarship at Princeton. Barbro's passion for foreign affairs and diplomacy led her to be hired by the State Department as a Foreign Service officer in 1980. She served in 15 jobs in 24 years, many of them in violent, high-intensity, danger-pay posts. She was a liaison with the 82nd

and 101st Airborne Divisions when we invaded Grenada in 1984, just before the Russians and Cubans turned the island into a military base. She studied Spanish and spent two years in El Salvador, that was ravaged by guerrilla warfare and a huge earthquake. In 1986, she was assigned to the Army War College in Carlisle, PA. As the only civilian and the only woman in her group, this was a chance to learn about civil/military cooperation and debate the merits/ downsides of the use of force.

Then off to the Caribbean as deputy at our regional Embassy in Barbados. This is where Barbro met Alex and got married surrounded by parents and palm trees. Next was DC and the Bureau of Political Military Affairs, grappling with horrid human rights crimes in former Yugoslavia and U.S. intervention in Somalia. Then, the National Security Council on Latin American Affairs and on to Mexico City for 3 years with Alex and their newly adopted Russian kids, Maria and Alexander, sister and brother, 3 and 5 years old. The greatest gift imaginable!

A job as head of the NATO office followed, and then off to the most fascinating, challenging job of them all, Ambassador to the Republic of Niger - the worlds poorest country, and a major uranium producer. The President had just been assassinated and a military junta taken charge. The goal was peaceful transition back to democracy. The rumored Niger/Iraq uranium deal surfaced at this time. Barbro remains engaged in women's health, and poverty reduction efforts since retiring.
