

Widely acclaimed Torrey Pines High School teacher Abbey Brown introduced her students Priyanka and Gitanjali Multani who presented their research and solution for early detection of ovarian cancer, the fifth leading cause of death among women. Treatment tends to be reactive rather than preventative, with a mere 45.6% survival rate five years from diagnosis. Chemotherapy is effective in only 37% of patients. Although biomarker Antigen-125 had been previously identified, B7-H4 is a better biomarker. Multani Sisters' work can identify B7-H4 in the bloodstream through colorimetric detection where light waves reflect off gold nanoparticles (crazy, right?). These lateral flow assays/tests use color strips to detect B7-H4, associated with ovarian cancer risk. Future research seeks to use this method to diagnose the cancer's stage. The students/ researchers/scientists/geniuses were motivated to commence this research when one of them was diagnosed with ovarian cancer herself. In addition to research, they seek to raise awareness. Their presentation concluded with a rare and well-deserved standing ovation. Reacting to the dearth of domestic media

coverage of our President Trump, Fine Master Half Biscuit took it upon himself to improve our citizenship with news from the Netherlands associated with our president. We are all now in favor of the Netherlands Second movement.

Healing Stress, Anxiety Trauma & PTSD with Sheila Henry, Counselor in San Diego

lthough I was born in APittsburgh, Pennsylvania, I consider myself a Californian. I came to San Francisco with a friend at the end of my junior year in college. We traveled by Greyhound bus across the country and then got waitress jobs first in San Francisco and then Los Angeles. (These were the only jobs that I was fired from.)
