

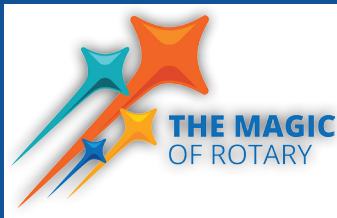

THE KROC SCHOOL OF PEACE STUDIES AT THE UNIVERSITY OF SAN DIEGO

Darren Kew (Ph.D. in International Relations, Tufts University, 2002) is Dean of the Joan B. Kroc School of Peace Studies, where he is also a professor. He studies the relationship between conflict resolution methods – particularly interfaith and inter-ethnic peacebuilding – and democratic development in Africa, Northern Ireland, and the United States. Much of his work focuses on the role of civil society groups in this development. He has also been a consultant on peace and democracy initiatives to the United Nations, USAID, US Institute of Peace, the US State Department, and to a number of NGOs, including the Carter Center. He monitored the last seven Nigerian elections and the 2007 elections in Sierra Leone, and in 2023-24 co-facilitated a working group of religious leaders focusing on religion and peacebuilding in Belfast, Northern Ireland. Professor Kew was asked by the British and American governments to join an influential international commission requested by the Nigerian government in 2010, which contributed to a major overhaul of its election system. He is author of numerous works on Nigerian politics and conflict resolution, including the book *Civil Society, Conflict Resolution, and Democracy in Nigeria* (Syracuse UP, 2016), and his articles have appeared in *International Negotiation*, *the Journal of Democracy*, and *Current History*, among others.

- International security, crisis intervention, and Early Warning/Early Response
- Conflict resolution efforts as grassroots approaches to promoting democracy
- Conflict and democracy in Africa (especially Nigeria), including elections
- International negotiation and mediation
- Restorative Justice
- Nonviolence as a practice and social movement development

After his presentation and Q&A session, **Janine Pack**, Chair of our club's Peace Committee, presented Mr. Azim Khamisa with the prestigious Peacemaker of the Year Award. This annual award is given to an individual or organization who demonstrates a remarkable history of promoting peace in the world.

War, Peace and.....Love

In the last year, I've been a member of the Pathways to Peace Committee. My friends wondered how a committee could contribute to peace in the world. It seems to be in an ethereal prize, particularly these days.

But, let me tell you a story within my own family that exemplifies how the children of former enemies can unite in love: On August 9, 1945 an American B-29 carried a second nuclear bomb toward Kokura, a Japanese steel town and imperial army arsenal. A teenage girl lived in a town nearby. The weather that day was cloudy and the target in Kokura was obscured by fires set by an earlier American raid. The mission to Kokura was aborted and the bomber flew to the secondary target-Nagasaki. Forty thousand Japanese civilians died with an estimated final death toll of 80,000. At the time, my father was a sergeant stationed in New Guinea and my husband's father was in the Navy, both fighting the Japanese.

Kokura and the Japanese teenager were both spared. She grew up, married and had a daughter Setsuko. Setsuko grew up, married and had a daughter - Mari Momii. Fifteen years ago, Mari was traveling for work to San Francisco and at the last minute decided to attend a party. There she met Michael Pack, our son. They were happily married for 13 years until she died in April from breast cancer. In May, we traveled to Japan to be with our son and help him grieve the loss of his wife and our dear daughter-in-law. There was much sadness but also a shared love, uniting our Japanese family with our own, joined by laughter and wonderful memories of Mari. The Momii family showered us with hospitality and kindness.

This Christmas, we reunited with the Momii family to enjoy our traditional American Christmas with them in Japan. We had an America- style Christmas dinner and as pictured below, we once again enjoyed the warmth of each other's company (conversation aided by my son and Google Translate). We also shared a love for American baseball. I am a Dodgers' fan and Shohei Ohtani, a prized Dodger player, is held with great pride by the Japanese. (On the other hand, my son is an avid San Diego Padres fan.) Mari was always in our thoughts and we toasted her with her favorite champagne.



We enjoyed our Christmas festivities in Japan with our Japanese family.

In the end, we must remember that all families love equally and although peace may seem to be a distant state, it is achievable. Former enemies of war, peoples with no understanding of one another, can unite in love years later.
