CAIRN KNIGHT campbell

After graduating from the Naval Academy, Knight Campbell excelled in flight school, learning to pay attention to detail, manage fear, and confront risk with his team. Choosing to fly the mighty SH60, he led Sailors on three deployments. Knight then went back to the Naval Academy earning Masters degrees in leadership from UMD and the Naval War College. More importantly he had the honor of leading over 700 Midshipmen. From tackling 24-hour crucible events alongside his people to teaching advanced leadership theory at the collegiate level, he left the tour with a burning passion for helping people reach their fullest potential as leaders.

In 2006, he and his wife Leonie decided to climb the high point in every state- only 10 left now! They found deep passion for the experience of climbing mountains. Seeing the limits of teaching leadership in a classroom, Knight knew outdoor adventure would be a perfect place for leaders to challenge themselves and thrive. He started teaching rock climbing, hiking, and mountain biking for REI Outdoor School, and then he did a 30-day expedition in Alaska with NOLS to become an instructor there as well. Seeing the need for experiential leadership development, he completed an Executive Leadership Coaching Certificate at Georgetown University. Knight created Cairn

Kaci Madden introduced Melinda, Chief Operating Officer for Serving Seniors, which is dedicated to helping seniors in poverty live healthy and fulfilling lives.

They focus on 4 areas:

1. Nutrition - they serve

over 640,000 meals annually and are aiming to increase that to 1,000,000 this year! They also serve 800 seniors at their residences each day. 2. Mental health services 3. Health and Wellness 4. Enrichment and Activities - Senior Idol, Senior Prom, and BINGO!!!!

Housing - the shortage of affordable housing in San Diego is a huge problem for our seniors. 13% of seniors in the area are homeless and almost 50% have been at some point. Serving Seniors own 3 communities = 412 homes and have another 2 communities in the pipeline to help provide safe and clean residences for these folks. They also have a Transitional Housing Program, which has helped over 1,000 seniors get off the streets and into permanent housing within a few months time.

Melinda closed by inviting the group to their 50th anniversary Gala on April 18th at the Marriott Marquis downtown.

President Kim closed the meeting with a positive thought leaving us motivated to practice kindness going into the weekend.
