**Shelley Zimmerman** joined National University in January of 2019 as a Chancellor appointed professor focusing on public safety and leadership.

Prior to this appointment **Chief Shelley Zimmerman** was hired by the San Diego Police Department in October of 1982. She was promoted to Chief of Police on March 4, 2014 and retired on March 2, 2018 after an illustrious thirty-five-year career. She was born in Cleveland, Ohio and is a graduate of The Ohio State University, with a degree in Criminal Justice. She is also a graduate of the FBI National Academy, FBINA #241.

During **Chief Zimmerman's** tenure as Chief (2014-2018) San Diego experienced historic low crime rates, including the lowest homicide rate per capita of any of the largest cities in the country. In 2017, the City of San Diego had the

lowest overall crime in the past 49 years and was named the safest large city in America.

Chief Zimmerman received numerous awards and citations throughout her career which included; the San Diego Press Club Headliner of the year award for her undercover work, the San Diego Business Journal's Woman Who Mean Business Exemplary Award for her civic involvement with both the business and residential communities, the San Diego Police Foundation Women in Blue Award for her commitment to making San Diego one of the safest large cities in the United States and the Gold Key Award from the Hotel/Motel Association for her commitment to the Hospitality and Tourism Industry.

I was one 12 HS seniors who spent June 1969 in Japan, and 10 Japanese HS Seniors spent July in LA. Neither group went to school, but instead were

hosted by Rotarians and travelled throughout Japan and California. That summer changed my life. We watched Neil Armstrong land on the moon on a tiny BW TV in Kyoto. In 1969 Americans in Japan were still rare and Japan was a far more insular country than now. I was exposed to a religion other than Lutheranism and realized most of the world actually worships different Gods and speak languages other than English. What inspired me was the sincere desire of our Japanese Rotarian hosts to be nice, expose us to their world and culture and treat us with respect and kindness despite our being dumb clueless HS students, and to realize how big the world was but also folks are not that different if you open your eyes and listen. After that summer, I realized that the United States was not the center of the universe and our country was only a young upstart to the ancient cultures of Asia, and Americans are generally shockingly ignorant about history, geography and sadly many times xenophobic. I came away from that trip with a profound desire to learn more (and to do more) to promote among all people of this earth understanding and respect for other countries and their people, cultures, and their religions. I found that Rotary is the perfect place to attempt to try and realize that goal. I fail frequently, but I try. I still maintain a busy law practice, am married to Sandy for 47 years this August, and am blessed by 3 great children and 3 better grandchildren, and 2 crazy huge Golden Doodles.
