arbara Bry has been a successful entrepreneur in both the for-profit and non-profit sectors. She recently announced that she will be a candidate for San Diego City Council District 1 which includes La Jolla, University City and Carmel Valley.

Currently, she is the chief operating officer of Blackbird Ventures that invests in and incubates early stage tech companies, and she and her husband Neil Senturia have written a weekly column on innovation and entrepreneurship for U-T San Diego. In 2014, they were recognized by the

SBA as "Small Business Journalists of the Year" for San Diego and Imperial Counties. Last year, Barbara was appointed by Commerce Secretary Penny Pritzker to the National Advisory Council on Innovation and Entrepreneurship. She is the first San Diegan to be selected.

Barbara was on the founding team of ProFlowers.com that started in 1998 in a small office in La Jolla. She was the first Associate Director of CONNECT, which has been recognized internationally for its role in nurturing early stage companies, and she is the founder of San Diego Athena, that has become the leading organization for women in the San Diego tech and life science community. Barbara has served on many non-profit boards including Planned Parenthood of the Pacific Southwest, and she has been a member of many community organizations including Rotary Club 33. Her numerous awards include selection as "Woman of the Year" by Assembly Speaker Toni Atkins, the CONNECT Distinguished Contribution Award for Technology Innovation, and induction into the San Diego Women's Hall of Fame.

was born and raised in a small town called Mbale in the eastern part of Uganda - East Africa. As a teenager, my mother sent me to attend high school in the city, Kampala, because there was a belief in our community that the education in the city was better than what we had in my town. Indeed, I got engineering school where I graduated with a Bachelor of engineering specializing in telecommunications engineering. In my final year, I got a job offer from the biggest wireless carrier in my country. I never went back to my hometown except for regular visits.

Approximately 4 years ago, my fiancée (ex) won a lottery - the diversity visa lottery - from the US government (the US government gives up to 50,000 green cards to low immigrants in the US). We were suddenly faced with a life changing decision to make: to move or not to move. We had a pretty established life there, which made it a little hard to decide. But at the end of the day, being the optimist I am, I believed things would work out for the best. They did.

Life in the US has been interesting, and enlightening. When we first got here, I thought I would use my African superhero powers to adjust *quickly,* so I hit the ground running by starting my own company doing private work as a consultant. The realities were a little different than I had hoped. So I took a step back and accepted a job offer from one of my clients at the time. I still work for Ericsson Inc. as a Consultant specializing in business assurance. I tified Information Systems Auditor & HiTech Management in the 3 years I've been here.

I first came to San Diego for work that ended up lasting a little longer than expected. I loved the city and decided to move. I've recently managed to convince my two siblings to move here too from different parts of the US. They love it - at least that's what they tell me. My parents and a few more siblings still live in Africa though.
