Dr. Dennis Bucko

Carroll Dennis Bucko was born December 19, 1941, in West Springfield, Massachusetts and was educated in the public school system. In high school Dennis was junior and senior year class president 2 years and participated in soccer, track and the marching band as well as in a small Dixieland band as a trumpet player. Dennis received a Bachelor of Arts in chemistry from American International College and served as class President and was selected to give the graduating class oration. He received his M.D. degree in 1967 from the University of Vermont. Dennis also met and married Sally Clerkin while in Vermont and they have three children (Dan, Wendy and Sarah) and seven grandchildren.

In 1968, after a year at Rhode Island Hospital/Brown University as an intern in Surgery, Dennis was commissioned as a Lieutenant Commander in the Public Health Service and served for two very cold but exciting and rewarding years stationed in Alaska. After a four year General

Surgery residency at the University of Utah, and a two year Plastic Surgery residency at the University of Michigan he was board certified in Plastic Surgery in 1977 and stayed on at the University of Michigan for five years as Assistant Professor of Plastic Surgery while maintaining a part-time private practice with the chairman of the Section of Plastic Surgery at the University of Michigan.

In 1981 the Bucko family moved from the "rust belt" to the "sun belt" in La Jolla, California. Dennis started his own full time private plastic surgery practice, after spending three years at Scripps Clinic developing their satellite plastic surgery programs. Dr. Bucko has continued to teach as a clinical Assistant Professor of Plastic Surgery at UCSD for over 35 years. He has also volunteered on cleft palate teams in the United States and in Mexico, as the leader of Southwest Medical Teams program in Oaxaca, Mexico in 1992, and as a surgeon on the Rotary- connected Mercy Outreach Surgical Teams

(MOST) trips to Mexico for the past fifteen years. He is also a board member of M.O.S.T.

His leisure time activities include playing guitar and harmonica (especially blues style) with the Rotary band, California Cogs. He also enjoys tennis, kayaking, sailing and scuba diving. Dr. Bucko joined Rotary in 1987 and has been a long-time member of the La Jolla Golden Triangle Rotary International Service Committee and was elected to the LJGT Rotary Board in 1997.

Dennis has apprenticed with A.Wasil, a professional sculptor, working on heroic size bronze pieces placed locally over the years. Dennis has displayed his own bronze piece in the La Jolla Contemporary Art Gallery and in his office. His works have sold locally. His most recent unfinished work is a representational style bronze of the "Virgin of Guadalupe", in one half scale, commissioned to be placed in the Mercy Hospital Clinic lobby when completed.
