Diane Cox, Co-Founder and Development Director Just in Time for Foster Youth

Diane is a co-founder of Just in Time for Foster Youth; she served as Vice Chair and then Chair of the Board until becoming the Development Director in 2014. Her responsibility is to engage the greater community in the Just in Time mission, ensuring the financial sustainability of the organization. Since 2003, she has been instrumental in raising the JIT budget from \$20,000 to \$4 million, serving over 800 youth annually.

Diane is credited with creating the Coach Approach to Mentoring, an innovative training founded on the belief that everyone is creative, resourceful, and whole, and that transformative change occurs when we step outside our own agenda, build rapport, understanding and trust, and ask powerful questions that expand thinking and promote insight.

A graduate of the University of Michigan and the Hudson Institute of Coaching, Diane enjoyed a successful 24-year career as a senior account representative for First American Title Insurance Company in Rancho Santa Fe and Del Mar, California. Earlier in her life, Diane was a high school English teacher, editor of a town paper, and director of public relations for a nonprofit health resort, always in search of ways to serve and grow.
