ABOUT TED TALKS

TED began in 1984 as a conference where Technology, Entertainment and Design converged, and today covers almost all topics — from science to business to global issues — in more than 100 languages. The first TED conference included a demonstration of the compact disc, the e-book and cutting-edge 3D graphics from Lucas Film, while mathematician Benoit Mandelbrot demonstrated how to map coastlines using his developing theory of fractal geometry. on how to map coastlines using his developing theory of fractal geometry.

Despite a stellar lineup, the first event lost money; finally in 1990, the world was ready for TED Talks. The TED Conference became an annual event in Monterey, California, attracting a growing and influential audience from many different disciplines united by their curiosity and open-mindedness — and also by their shared discovery of an exciting secret.

Accordingly, the years 2001–2006 saw three major additions to the TED family:

- A sister conference, TED Global, held in locations around the world
- The TED Prize, which grants its winners one wish to change the world
- TED Talks, in which the best TED content is released free online.

In the fall of 2012, TED Talks celebrated its one billionth video view. TED talks are usually in the form of a short powerful 18 minutes or less talk. As TED Talks continue to be watched around the world, with an average of 17 new page views a second, TED conferences and events continue to inspire, motivate and thrill attendees.

TED is a global community, welcoming people from every discipline and culture who seek a deeper understanding of the world. We believe passionately in the power of ideas to change attitudes, lives and, ultimately, the world. On TED.com, we're building a clearinghouse of free knowledge from the world's most inspired thinkers — and a community of curious souls to engage with ideas and each other, both online and at TED and TEDx events around the world, all year long.

In fact, everything we do — from our Conferences to our TED Talks to the projects sparked by the TED Prize, from the global TEDx community to the TED-Ed lesson series — is driven by this goal: How can we best spread great ideas?

TED is owned by a nonprofit, nonpartisan foundation. Our agenda is to make great ideas accessible and spark conversation.

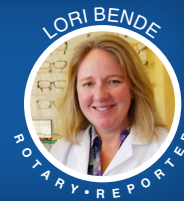
