Under his stewardship, the organization has received local, state, national and international recognition for its programs including being named the non-profit of the year in 2017 in California.



She taught us that eating disorders can occur in person who show no outward signs of any illness and can often occur in persons who are high functioning and driven individuals. An eating disorder is generally caused by both environmental and genetic factors that cause an obsession with food and body images, as well as an increased focus on the risks of gaining weight. She helped teach us that eating disorders are a health crisis that disrupt personal and family functioning, that it is a physical injury, and requires medical intervention.

# Michael Barolin Pathways to Peace Rotary District 5340

La Jolla Golden Triangle Rotary Club Chair, Rotary District 5340 Pathways to Peace

Charter Member of LJGT Rotary & Chair District 5340 Pathways to Peace. My 32-year Rotary journey began in June 1986 as a charter member of LJGTRC and has included many Club and District roles, including president in '96-'97 and many committee and event chair roles. My major interest in developing and advancing peacefocused programming within Rotary I can trace back to 9/11 and the attack on the World Trade Center. A number of District 5340 Rotarians from several clubs wanted to explore how in Rotary we might learn from this horrific event and we initiated a dialogue focused on creating better understanding of conflicting cultures. Ultimately this led to the creation of Pathways to Peace, now a standing District committee fostering a range of programs including a Peace Chair in every club, an annual Peace Leadership Training Seminar, an annual Peace Forum with the Kroc School of Peace Studies at USD, Rotary Model United Nations, an annual Peace Award,

support for Rotary Peace Fellow candidates, and an array of initiatives and partnerships designed to advance how everything that Rotary does and stands for advances Rotary as an "agent for peace". This has fit well with Rotary International's developing position as one of the world's premiere peacebuilders, linking Rotary's work in each Area of Focus with peacebuilding, conflict prevention and resolution.

Recently retired from Scripps Health.

After 32 years with Scripps Health, much of it as Chief Public Policy Officer, I retired in mid-January. My career in public relations, public affairs and government relations began with my time in the Navy as Public Affairs Officer, continued as VP Public Relations for Phillips-Ramsey, then San Diego's largest advertising and public relations agency, and ultimately to Scripps. My retirement plan includes a major role for my Rotary peace development work. Also I'm currently on two boards (San Diego OASIS and the

Community Health Improvement Partners). And there is now ample time devoted to family affairs. All is good!

Family sixth-generation is Californians. The Bardin Family in California dates to the mid-1850s when my great grandfather traveled by wagon train across the Oregon and California Emigrant Trails eventually settling in Salinas. My mother is also part of a family that dates back to the 1880s in the San Francisco area. My wife Arlene (retiraed registered nurse) and I met in San Francisco in 1965 and we will celebrate our 53rd anniversary in October. We moved to San Diego in 1969 and raised our family here.
