Krishna's story was truly touching and he exemplifies what it means to be a Rotarian for Life.

Presentation of the Day

This week's presentation was put on by Joseph Anthony Travers the founder of Saved in America that is a non-profit organization that tracks down missing children to rescue them from their abductors and to save them from being trafficked. San Diego is second on the list in terms of problems with sex trafficking, something that is linked to drugs and gangs. A former police officer and private investigator, he has dedicated his life to serving those who most need his help. Through his dedication he has amassed a team of retired law enforcement officers and military personnel who all work, without pay, to rescue children. He has over 40 operatives in San Diego and 200 reserve officers around the country. He has help train other local organization across the company and has appeared on national news media. He shared a voicemail message from one of his first rescues thanking him for his help, a message that shows how valuable his work is. It is clear that his is a noble organization that was worthy of being this year's charity of choice for our club.

Debra Kelley - Bio for Rotary Club

Debra Kelley is a public health professional with more than 30 years of policy and programmatic experience in tobacco control, clean air and climate change. She has played a key role in making California workplaces smoke-free and in promoting local smoke-free outdoor policies in dining areas, beaches, parks, Petco Park and other venues. She has fought for state and local laws to reduce youth use of tobacco, such as raising the legal age to 21, eliminating self-service sales of tobacco, defining and regulating e-cigarettes as tobacco products, and requiring tobacco retailers to be licensed. She received the prestigious Carol M. Russell Leadership Award from the California Tobacco Control Program and the David P. Rall Award for Advocacy from the American Public Health Association. She has been a board member of the SDSU Research Foundation and the Clean Cities Coalition, in addition to membership with a variety of professional groups.

After a fulfilling career with the American Lung Association, she now consults with a variety of organizations on public health policy issues. Her love of travel has recently taken her to Southeast Asia, and she will soon be visiting Africa and South America. Her other passions are swing dancing, music, yoga, politics and community service.

Dory Beatrice Griffith hails from Brooklyn, New York, and professionally is a Clinical Social Worker, providing counseling in her private practice. She is thinking of retiring some day.

In 1997 she became deeply involved in volunteer work with Tibetan refugees in India, which led her to join La Jolla Golden Triangle Rotary Club in 2000. She was then able to implement various projects there, such as obtaining funds for major renovation of a school for handicapped children, and for a math/science computer lab for orphaned and destitute students. After doing several projects in India, she moved on to work in Bolivia, where she worked on water projects in remote rural regions, and then ultrasound screening for pregnant women.

You might notice that she loves to travel around the world, whether in a Rotarian capacity of working with overseas projects, or as an ordinary tourist.

On the local level, in 2004 she co-founded with Marty Rosenstein a Model United Nations program to get youth engaged with global issues. She is pleased that Model UN has gone on to become a District Program, with wide participation by many clubs. She also co-founded with Mike Bardin a District Pathways to Peace Committee to develop ways that Rotary can be an ever-growing force for world peace.

Dory is a Paul Harris Fellow, member of the Rotary Foundation Bequest Society, and graduate of the Rotary Leadership and Development Academy.

She was honored to be chosen as President of LJGT for the year 2010-11.

Rotary also gave her the gift of meeting a fellow Rotarian: Pete Griffith, and they married in Oct. 2009, and this has brought 5 delightful granddaughters into her life!

Professionally Dory worked for several years with the local agency Survivors of Torture International, providing counseling and performing psychological evaluations to refugees escaping from war or persecution in their countries. This led her to launch a new project in Sept. 2010, Project Refuge, to provide short-term housing and social support for refugees who have suffered deeply in their country.

Dory's current passion is with issues around aging and mutual support. She has founded a Rotary "Village" to help us do that skillfully. More on this today.
