Corey Polant manages the external partnerships to the Zahn Innovation Platform (ZIP) Launchpad from philanthropic to overall community relations engagement opportunities. The ZIP Launchpad is the on campus startup incubator for SDSU students, helping bring their early stage idea to life.

Corey works daily with entrepreneurs, San Diego business leaders, foundations and corporations to build and grow the overall entrepreneurial community connected and engaged with the university's entrepreneurial efforts. As a native New Yorker, he also leads the SDSU alumni engagement efforts for the New York region and travels back east three times a year to build the alumni network.

Corey graduated from SDSU in 2015 with a degree in Sociology and is now pursuing his Masters at SDSU in Public Administration. He's involved with San Diego Rotaract, San Diego Regional Chamber of Commerce Young Leaders, a "Big" for Big Brothers Big Sisters and volunteers as a foundation board member to Thrive Public Charter Schools.

Cathy Pucher works with aspiring entrepreneurs at SDSU's Zahn Innovation Platform Launchpad. Zahn Innovation Platform Launchpad helps SDSU students, faculty and staff launch a start-up from their early stage ideas. Forty teams and over 100 students work concurrently to bring their idea to life while receiving mentoring, pro bono legal guidance, prototyping services, business acumen, and access to early stage funding in 24/7 co-working space on campus. Shelterbox is often a first responder in natural disasters all over the world, rushing in with tents, water filters, etc. emergency assistance. Afterwords, lim Frost generously donated \$1000. Today it was announced that the Community Service Committee has decided to donate \$500 as a match to club donations, either from individuals or committees, to ShelterBox. Cynthia Villis told us about the need of our visiting scholars for FANS in the hot weather. It is hard to study in this heat!

Our speaker was Karin Davies of Saving Babies' Lives in Ethiopia. She is a retired San Diego pediatrician who lived in Ethiopia as a child. She had learned that many infant deaths in Ethiopia were preventable if the right medical care was available. So she designed a program to train medical staff at the University of Gondar doctors, nurses, midwives in recognizing and treating newborn difficulties, especially with breathing. She and a colleague worked with a Rotary Vocational Training Team who made 4 visits to Ethiopia over 2 years, to train obstetricians, pediatricians, etc. Much of the training was hands-on, so providers could be sure they'd mastered the skills. They also learned that Teamwork and Communication skills were needed and requested, so this was added to the program. They then went on to a further program involving training the trainers. They also provided birthing kits. Our very own Fary Moini was instrumental in developed Skype conferencing.

Davies and crew then went on to start another grant to integrate the courses into the university curriculum.

Karin expressed her thanks to La Jolla Golden Triangle RC for our assistance and involvement.

The meeting closed with President Alex trying to stump us with "Name that Tune." He'd play a tune, and we got to guess the name and singer. We usually prevail!
