Update in breast cancer and cancer detection Haydee Ojeda-Fournier



Haydee Ojeda-Fournier, MD, is a board-certified radiologist. She specializes in breast imaging and the detection of breast cancer utilizing mammography, sonography, molecular breast imaging and magnetic resonance imaging (MRI). Among the procedures she performs are image-guided biopsies (utilizing multiple imaging modalities), fine needle aspiration, and biopsies of axillary (armpit) lymph nodes.

Before joining UC San Diego Health, Dr. Ojeda was on the clinical faculty at the University of Cincinnati.

Dr. Ojeda earned her medical degree from the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine. She completed her diagnostic radiology residency and women's imaging fellowship at the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine. She is board certified in diagnostic radiology.

Dr. Ojeda is a member of the American College of Radiology, Association of University Radiologists, Alliance of Medical Student Educators in Radiology, Radiological Society of North America, Society of Breast Imaging, American Institute of Ultrasound in Medicine, and International Society of Magnetic

Dr. Ojeda was recently recognized as a Physician of Exceptional Excellence "2019 Top Doctors" in the field of Diagnostic Radiology, Breast Imaging. Selected by peers both within specialty and outside of specialty as one of San Diego's top doctor, July 2019. This is the second time to receive this honor.



Returning to the *Most Dynamic Rotary Club in the World* 3 years ago was such a joyful day... I'd been in the Club for nearly 20 years when a senior moment blip caused me to move to a Club closer to my home. Happily, very little changed within the *Most Dynamic Club* in those 8 intervening years -- same fabulous members plus vibrant new ones, same roster of extraordinary programs and activities plus amazing new ones, and greater than ever service committee involvements. But what has really changed *now*, in just the last 2 years, has been the drive down Genesee Avenue! It still seems like just yesterday that I was chasing the rabbits off the property where I'd build the first office building in University City. That was the first of half a dozen other new buildings I was in charge of building along this stretch of Genesee Ave. Now, except for the 16-story office tower next door, my handiwork is nearly hidden from the street, or been demolished (i.e. the bridge connecting the Marriott to the shopping center), to accommodate the new, massive overhead transportation structure.

As a brief background, my 35-year professional career was in commercial construction management, and I was the first (and for 2 decades the only) woman construction manager in San Diego. During those years, I was responsible for the development, often from land purchase and financing through construction, of a wide variety of structures -- hospital complexes, high schools, medical buildings, a library and a computer center, high rise office and condo developments, and some less exciting projects like road infrastructure and parking garages.

What hasn't changed through the years though is that I'm still a University of Washington Huskies fan and return for annual visits to my home town of Seattle; I'm still passionate about skiing and did my annual run (just one though) down Whistler Mountain last April as my birthday celebration; I still love travelling, and this year added Costa Rica's coastal waters and inland jungle to my fun adventures (my grandson's choice.) My 2 sons (Ian and Chris) and my daughter (LoriAnn) and her family all live in San Diego ... and 15 years ago I moved into the house I designed and built in Solana Beach, where I live with Toby, my faithful furry companion.

Once again, I'm thrilled to be back with *The* Most *Dynamic Rotary Club in the World*.
