


Dr. Christopher J. Rogers is a board certified Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation physician and founder of the San Diego Orthobiologics Medical Group. With more than 25 years of clinical experience, Dr. Rogers is recognized as one of the world's leading experts in the field of Orthopedic Regenerative Medicine, specializing in the non-surgical treatment of spine and joint conditions. He has developed new techniques for the treatment of tendon injuries, osteoarthritis and disc degeneration which provide safe and viable alternatives to surgery.

Dr. Rogers serves as a Voluntary Clinical Professor in the Department of Orthopedics

at UCSD, and has practiced at Orthopedic Specialists of North County where he successfully treated more than 80,000 San Diegans including many professional athletes, healthcare providers and leaders in business and government. As a result of his work with the PGA and LPGA, he was featured on the Golf Channel's Golf Fitness Academy and Golf Channel's World Golf Fitness Summit. Alex Monroe introduced our speaker **Dan Sheehan**. **Dan** served 12 years as a Marine Corps helicopter fighter pilot and served 2 tours in Iraq. His topic today is the first week of the Iraq invasion, that occurred 18 years ago this month, and titled: The Invasion of Iraq: A Fighter Pilot's View.

Dan was a 28-year-old Captain with the call sign **Shoe**. He flew a 2-seater Cobra helicopter manned with guided missiles and unguided rockets. He gave a narration of his time and duties, including dramatic video of his combat missions and specific special engagement strikes in Iraq. His squadron division included 8 members with the call signs Fuse, BT, Count, Weasel, Spock, Ike, **Gash**, and **Jojo**. They flew Cobras and Hueys and were responsible for close air support of troops on the ground. The conditions were far from ideal dealing with sandstorms and torrential rain. We thank **Dan** and his squadron for their courage and service.

Dan has written 2

books both available on Amazon. The first is titled After Action - The Story of a Cobra Pilot's Journey. This book won several awards and in 2020 was named as recommended reading for all Marines by the Commandant of the Marine Corps. The second is Continuing Actions - A Warriors Guide to Coming Home. This is a guidebook for veterans and their families on how to face and navigate the challenges after coming home from combat.

Rick Clark shared a story how his combat unit received support from a Cobra unit predecessor that saved their bacon, as is much obliged.

Emidio ended the meeting with some eloquent quotes and ironically turned the meeting over to the Peace Committee.
