After we broke out of our rooms, **President Emidio** kicked off the meeting with our regular greeting and turned the meeting over to **Peter Ballantyne**, Rotarian of the Day. **Peter** gave an inspirational prayer, giving thanks for the protection of family and friends, blessing them with peace, hope and love and asking for strength and wisdom.

Peter has a varied and multifaceted background in both sports and music. He is originally from Long Island, in a town now called Westbury, but once called Frog Hollow, whose football team was named "The Frogs". (He didn't say how many football games they won.) He spent summers in upstate New York at Hulett's Landing on Lake George. He is one of six children (number 5). His father was a WWII veteran, who received two bronze stars and two purple hearts. His father worked in freight forwarding out of NYC and was on the Board of Governors at the downtown Athletic Club, famous for the Heisman Trophy. Every Saturday morning **Peter** could touch the Heisman trophy and played sports in the club all day long. From this Club, he watched the Twin towers being built.

He met his wife in 1976, the quintessential girl next door (in this case, just around the block). They have just celebrated their 36th anniversary this year.

He went to Holy Cross College for two years, played baseball there and got recruited by the Cardinals minor league, but hurt his shoulder not long after playing with them. After this, he turned to music for a while and played in clubs in NYC. He then moved to Bristol, Rhode Island, got his Coast Guard license and worked as a captain in Newport Harbor. He went back to college, attending Siena College, outside of Albany, New York and graduated in 1984. He and his wife then moved to San Diego so his wife could pursue her graduate studies at SDSU and UCSD. She is a PhD and Executive Director for Research at Moores Cancer Center.

He worked at the Mission Bay Aquatic Center running water sports programs for 17 years. After observing some individuals with disabilities doing watersports, his attention turned to adapting water sports equipment for individuals with disabilities and this has dominated his life ever since. He ran the Disabled America's cup and traveled America sharing adaptive water technologies. He then worked at the Firehouse YMCA in La Jolla with a focus on performing arts and music and following that, worked in senior communities. In 2012, he started with the Paralyzed Veterans of America, Cal-Diego Chapter. He goes to DC each year to advocate for veterans rights and benefits and he feels blessed to work with these inspirational people. He also served as Chairman of the Disabled Service Advisory Council for San Diego and with the City of San Diego on the Accessibility Advisory Council and is also the Director for Guitars 4 Veterans.

Currently, he is President of the San Diego Festival of Arts Foundation which gives roughly \$100,000 dollars a year to San Diegans with disabilities. The San Diego Festival of the Arts will occur September 11 and 12 this year and would he love us to join in and will update us as the festival gets closer.

Music is still a part of his life and he plays jazz standards with one group but can sit in with almost any band. His older son works with Golden Boy Mobility, adapting vehicles and vessels for individual disabilities. His younger son is finishing his aviation training in Pensacola. **Peter** and his family still travel to upstate New York for three weeks of silence and respite.

He appreciates being here and being part of LJGT Rotary Club.

Steven Weitzen inducted Peter into Rotary and praised Emidio for his great recruitment success. Peter puts us in the plus column for the year. Steve mentioned that Peter's background is a wonderful example of Rotary's "Service *above Self*". He presented **Peter** with a rotary pin and certificate and a 250 page manual, which could be *"great sleeping*" material". Steve mentioned it is invigorating for us to have such an inspirational new member. Welcome Peter Ballantyne!

We were then introduced to our speaker by **Diane Day**. As mentioned previously, two guests were particularly interested in attending because of the medical emphasis of our speaker. **Dr. Rogers** did not disappoint. He presented an informative, detailed and very interesting presentation (even for the less medically astute) on the present day possibility of orthopedic cell stem research and non-surgical treatment for spine and joint conditions.

Diane Day mentioned as an introduction that **Dr**. **Christopher J. Rogers** developed an interest in sports medicine in 1984 while he was an athletic trainer at the UCLA Athletic Department. At the same time, he was obtaining his bachelor's degree in kinesiology and biology. He then went to medical school at St. Louis University and is now a board certified Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation physician and founder of the San Diego Orthobiologics Medical Group.

As mentioned in his bio, "He has developed new techniques for the treatment of tendon injuries, osteoarthritis and disc degeneration which provide safe and viable alternatives to surgery. Dr. Rogers serves as a Voluntary Clinical Professor in the Department of Orthopedics at UCSD, and has practiced at Orthopedic Specialists of North County where he successfully treated more than 80,000 San Diegans including many professional athletes, healthcare providers and leaders in business and government."

During his slide presentation, **Dr. Rogers** described how this regenerative process works. He explained that stem cell therapy is extremely complicated and gave us a primer regarding the difficulties of stem cell therapy. He then explained the regenerative procedure as performed by his medical group. The talk was followed by various questions by our group.

Emidio closed the meeting with a thank you to Dr. Rogers and also honored his contribution by a donation to Angel's Flight West. He shared a thought for the week quoting Confucius: "It does not matter how slowly you go as long as you don't stop." See you next week!
