HEALTHY BRAIN AGING AND BRAIN INFLAMMATION

Matt invited our Club members to a Saturday, June 15 ceremony (10:30 am) installing a plaque on Mt Soledad to honor his father's service in underwater demoliton teams

We wished Fr Wayne Sanders a very Happy Birthday Christy provided not-too-gentle reminders to Mike Bardin and Rick Clark that their wives' birthdays are today. Rock on, Wayne, Arlene, and Nilsa!

Carolyn Fritz recounted our Club's participation in the habitat restoration project on March 23 at Cardiff State Beach. Those of us there learned to identify and then pulled A LOT OF invasive species, played with a few caterpillars and ladybugs, and learned about the Living Coast. The project reduces flooding on Highway 101 by building up the sand dunes and then planting native species whose roots hold the dunes in place against winter winds and tides. Invasive species take nutrients and space from native species, but don't have the deep root structures to anchor the dunes. All who participated agreed that it was a productive and relaxing morning that we'd like to do again. Thanks for creating this experience for us, **Carolyn** and **Jane**

Dr Jenny Parker of Solana Beach Eco Rotary invited us to an amazing (free) District Environmental Solutions Summit on Sunday, May 19, 10 am - 3 pm at San Dieguito County Park, 1628 Lomas Santa Fe, Del Mar. Five featured environmental topics will include tree planting and revegetation, saving pollinators, litter cleanups, plastic solutions, and food waste reduction. Rotary Club projects in the environmental sphere will also be featured (application deadline is May 10). Register at Environmental Solutions Summit | Rotary District 5340 (d5340environment.wixsite.com) Christy invited us to participate in the My First Home Project on Saturday, May 11, helping young adults who have transitioned out of foster care to set up their first homes. Three roles are available: Shoppers (help them to pick out/mark items from the Just in Time warehouse; 8:30 am - noon), Movers (help load and unload selected items into vehicles, 8:30 am - noon) and Drivers (drive your own SUV, truck, or van to the new home; 10 am - 2 pm). "Remember moving into your first home? Imagine doing it without the support of a loving family." The sponsoring organization Just in Time also seeks NEW items to stock the warehouse: Target/Walmart gift cards, bedding/sheets, comforters (queen), towels and bathmats, vacuums, toasters, cleaning supplies, microwaves, Tupperware sets, knives and cutting boards, pots, pans, dish sets, silverware, glassware, lamps, irons and ironing boards. Our Program Coordinator Par Excellence Stephen Tako announced that last week's presenters Pointeworks (https://www. pointeworks.org/) have donated two tickets for their inaugural performance on June 20 at the Conrad Performing Arts Center in La Jolla. A world premiere, the performance of five pieces will present a captivating joyfulness of dance, music, and surrounding oneself with creative and inspirational artists. Stephen will auction the tickets at the April 5 meeting. Past President Jacquie is organizing a dinner/ballet performance group to attend the event.

Past President/VP What-would-we-dowithout Linda Stouffer Wallis invited us to the Club Wine Soiree on April 26 at the UCSD Faculty Club. It is a FUNraiser, and not simply a chance to sip distinguished wines in a world-class intellectual setting. Auction items so far include sailing with Jim Frost, dinner at Rich Papike's, two nights at a private B&B winery in the MX Valle, use of a condo off-season in beautiful Whistler, BC (September 8-15), and of course Eric Freeberg's incomparable selected wines. **Garry Kachkovsky** is sending out the invitation to Club members and guests each week. This promises to be a wonderful event.

Past President and Font of Eternal Energy Brett Morey and Birthday Guy Fr Wayne invited us to participate in the upcoming Red Shoe Day on Wednesday, May 22 benefitting Ronald McDonald House Charities, meeting in the PF Chang's parking lot.

Past President **Bev Laursen**, also of the ZLAC (the initials of the four founding women's first names) Rowing Club, invited us to this year's 51st Crew Classic on Friday, April 5 from 3-7 pm (Crown Point Shores Park). Bev introduced our speaker **Susan Francia**, a two-time Olympic gold medalist, whose mother (biochemist **Katalin Kariko**) has been awarded a Nobel Prize in medicine and the UCSD Scripps Institution of Oceanography Nierenberg Prize. Such a gene pool -- tall, athletic, competitive!

Susan is an incredibly engaging and natural speaker. Emigrating with their family from

Hungary and the Iron Curtain in 1985, Susan's parents had to sell their Yugo on the black market and sew the proceeds into 3-year-old Susan's teddy bear to leave for the USA. At 6'2" tall in 9th grade, she was the first pick of every basketball and volleyball coach -- only to have them learn that she couldn't catch a ball. She attended the University of Pennsylvania, made the Dean's list, but didn't play sports there. Her mother advised that academics were most important, as "we didn't come to this country for you to screw around." After graduating with honors, Susan joined the US women's rowing team (Coach: "You're decent. You could go to the Olympics.") At that time everyone on the team was 6'2"-6'3" and performance was okay. BUT in 2008 after strenuous tryouts the team assembled would win Olympic gold in Beijing, leading from start to finish (Susan's internal race dialogue identical to the fighter pilot's prayer: "Don't f*** this up"). At this point Susan brought out her gold medal and placed the red ribbon around her neck, to our awe and applause.

A favorite memory was at the Beijing Olympic Village McDonald's, where athletes would gather (but not for the fast food, which most of them couldn't/wouldn't eat). "Once you've won gold, you can get in anywhere and do anything in the Olympic Village." There Susan met Dwight Howard, who put her gold medal around his neck (faux pas). They were joined soon after by Kobe Bryant. And for that one moment in time, as she watched these basketball icons appreciate her gold medal, Susan realized that she had something -- Olympic gold -that neither Dwight nor Kobe had.

Returning to SD, Susan applied to 50 jobs and got two interviews (they asked if she'd brought her Olympic gold medal; she had). She went back to the Olympic Training Center. Rowing on Otay Lake one day she decided to go back to the Olympics for a second time. This time it was harder; she had a record to uphold and had sustained a disc injury in her lower back. The team once again won gold at the 2012 London Olympics (she brought out this second gold medal on its purple ribbon). She showed us that the face of the medal is the goddess Nike, the goddess of victory.

Returning to SD, Susan coaches rowing, impacting the next generation of rowers. Her spirit was willing but her body did not want to go to the 2016 Olympics. She works in business development at a SD biotech, leading a team that sells reagents. Susan became a parent of a 3 year old and a 2 month old, and she notes that being tired from training for the Olympics is NOTHING compared to being tired as a parent. Susan is featured in the book The Path to Elite Level Leadership. During Q and A Stephen Tako acknowledged their mutual membership in the Hungarians Over 6 Feet Tall Club.

Christy closed our meeting with a round of announcements: Jim Davies was about to retire on Friday, March 29 as his last day of work. Yeehaw! David and Sarah Chong are about to begin the Camino de Santiago in Portugal. And Community Service meets right after the meeting.
