### Dan Gensler District Governor

2021 - 2022

Dan Gensler was 32 years old who he joined Rotary. Now at 58, after having been on many humanitarian trips, he sees Rotary in a different way compared to when he first joined. Over the years, Gensler has grown as a Rotarian dedicated to helping others. Recently, Gensler was chosen to be District Governor of Rotary and will serve in that position until June 30, 2022.

"I have stayed in Rotary all these years because I came to believe in the incredible humanitarian impact we make throughout the world...I've grown to appreciate Rotary in a much different light," he has shared in a speech.

Gensler has served as president of the Coronado club from 2006 to 2007 and was Rotarian of the year in 2004.

Looking back, Gensler moved to Orange County from his native Wisconsin in 1987, and by 1993 he and his wife moved to Coronado. After working in the financial world for some years, he opened his own business, The Gensler Group, in 1995. He is a certified financial planner and was recognized by Forbes Magazine among America's Top Financial

Gensler was introduced to Rotary through an acquaintance and first joined the Point Loma Club, eventually moving to the Coronado one. A few years later, Gensler was invited to get involved. He believes that based on the fact that someone asked him and believed he could do it, was the big motivating factor

Fellow Rotarian Bob Watson asked him to start a prosthetic clinic in Ensenada, Mexico. "It sure sounded interesting and he assured me that there were plenty of Rotarians who would be willing to help," recalled Gensler. While visiting a medical clinic in Ensenada he found out the clinic had some land that could be used to build a workshop to manufacture prosthetics. A friendly challenge was issued between two Rotarians, a contractor and an architect. The contractor would build the workshop if the architect provided the plans. The architect did come up with the plans and the contractor brought a crew down, and the workshop was built in 14 hours. Gensler then met a prosthetist, Herb Barrack, who helped design the inside of the workshop. "The clinic is still open today, almost 20 years later, in large part because of him," said Gensler.

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prosthetic patient, a 10-year-old boy named Victor, a double amputee due to an accident. Soon after receiving the prosthetics, the boy was seen playing basketball in the courtyard of the rehabilitation hospital. "It was magical and watching this all unfold seemed like such as miracle," said Gensler.

Years later, Victor went back to the clinic as a 17-year old riding his bike. A new set of prosthetic limbs were made for him and after putting them on he started doing trick bicycle show. Gensler believes that volunteering and seeing the amazing changes that can be brought to less fortunate people can change your life. "You'll experience the good in humanity and realize the best in yourself along with an enhanced sense of purpose. What you're able to do for others and the lifelong friendships you'll make along the way will change you and your life forever in ways you never imagined," he said.

Gensler's "life changing moment" was when he met Sister Ethel 15 years ago, during a convention in Copenhagen. Sister Ethel moved to South Africa and established the Missionvale Care Center outside Port Elizabeth. After hearing her speak, Gensler went to see her and set up a meeting. "I was so enamored and drawn into Sister Ethel's passion and love for the poor and the extreme challenges she faced," said Gensler.

Since that day Rotarians have provided 13 grants, set up a not-for-profit and sent \$685,000 for educational and humanitarian needs to Missionvale. In 2010, an opportunity came along to partner with TOMS Shoes for Missionvale. "Our first shipment contained 20,000 pairs of shoes which meant the little feet of Missionvale would no longer have to suffer. For many, this was the very first new pair they had ever owned," he recalled.

Gensler was there with other Rotarians, friends and families who volunteered, and was shocked to see the conditions of some of the kids' feet and how small they were for their age. He noticed children were worried that they may not get shoes if they did not get the first pair they were offered.

"As the proper fitting shoes went on their feet, the huge smiles on their faces provided a simple, yet profound expression of gratitude," he said.

As District Governor, Gensler has three goals he wants to accomplish: increasing membership by 50; international experiences like the trip to Guatemala next February and the home building project in Mexico; and third, vocational dental training trip to Kenya headed by Coronado Dentist Suzanne Popp.

One of the very first experiences with humanitarian projects was when Gensler visited a hospital where doctors were performing cleft palate surgery in Mexico. He took his oldest daughter Lauren, who was about 10 years old at the time, to bring lunch for the volunteers and share the experience with her. Coronadan Jim Vernetti, a dentist, was the founder of this program called Thousand Smiles.

Becoming involved for Gensler has become part of who he is, and he feels a lot of satisfaction doing that. "I found myself to be a connector, found the problem and identified the solution... that brings joy to so many of us...the more you push yourself, put yourself out there, the people you meet... life is enriched and has purpose for us," he said.

Gensler doesn't have major plans past the next year but he knows more opportunities to help will come along.

"Doors open, doors shut. I'm energized by doing community work, it has changed my life," he said.

He feels he has developed many friendships over time both here and outside the U.S. with people he has worked with, sharing a common goal. "When you embark on these trips. You see the suffering going on in the world. It's a privilege to see it and lend a hand in any way, shape or form," he explained.

Gensler is always amazed to see local volunteers who are willing to help, some who may not be well off and they could use the time to work an extra shift and earn more money instead of helping out.

In his new position, something he has prepared for the past two and-half years, Gensler will visit all 60 Rotary clubs in the district. He has visited five so far and hopes to visit three a week and finish in the fall. His role is to speak to each club but also go into specifics with individual boards to find out what challenges they are facing and how the district can help with tools and support. "I get to see it through a different lens. Each club is unique and different, it's fun to learn all those things," he said.

"There are a lot of good people in the world, when you meet one who feels so strongly, you [are motivated] to want to help those in need," he said.


