 Golden Rotarian Bulletin: Highlighted updates to the Golden Rotarian bulletin, featuring committee meeting schedules, upcoming social events, and a new member corner showcasing Jonathan and Samson's induction.

 Club Runner: Discussed the Club Runner online platform, detailing its functions like profile updates, attendance tracking, commitment management, message center, and account balance checks.

• District Citation: Presented a citation to the club for their achievements, acknowledging their accomplishments in

comparison to other clubs within the district.

 Peace Initiative: Introduced the Peace initiative, emphasizing its incorporation across various service avenues. Announced a multicultural dance project kickoff event to promote peace and address child bullying.

• Fundraiser Survey: In Garry Kachkovsky's absence, mentioned an ongoing survey to gauge interest in a fundraiser. Asked for input and ideas from club members.

 Community Service Meeting: Noted that a community service meeting would follow the current session, led by Janine and **Tim**, discussing plans for the upcoming year.

President Christy then introduced the speaker for the week, Luke Jacob. Luke Jacob initiated his talk by discussing the transition from traditional literacy to digital literacy in the 21st century. He recounted his previous presentation in 2021, where he explored the meaning of being literate in the digital era, encompassing the interpretation of visual and oral texts, public spaces, cultural artifacts, and the internet. In his subsequent presentation. Jacob delved into the concept of digital authorship and its implications. He mentioned that the audience consisted of both those who had attended his previous talk and those who hadn't, highlighting the continuation of the discourse.

He explored the notion that individuals in the contemporary digital landscape were not solely consumers but also creators. He emphasized that people were now actively involved in generating diverse digital content, including selfies, blogs, podcasts, and social media posts. He underscored how the Michael Slentz

of media to creators had significant consequences for the concept of authorship.

Jacob delved into the role of large language models like **ChatGPT** and their impact on the notion of authorship. He discussed how AI tools challenged traditional perceptions of authorship and raised questions about authenticity and ownership.

He touched upon media literacy and the challenges of discerning truth and credibility in a digital world inundated with information. He referred to tools and organizations that attempted to assess the credibility and biases of digital sources.

Jacob discussed the challenges educators encountered in teaching digital literacy and adapting to the evolving landscape of content creation. He mentioned the need to reconsider conventional approaches to evaluating student work considering the new paradigm of digital authorship.

He concluded by discussing ongoing discussions within the education field and broader society regarding the implications of digital authorship, AI, and media literacy.

The talk encompassed the evolving nature of literacy, the shift from consumption to creation in the digital age, the challenges of evaluating digital content, and the changing role of educators in fostering digital literacy.




















JONATHON (JOHNNY) HARRIS SECURITY GROUP
