IS HOMELESSNESS REALLY A HOUSING PROBLEM?

Greg Anglea, CEO of Interfaith Community Services and host of the Homeless in San Diego podcast, will explore the myths, realities, and misconceptions around homelessness, including impact of the recently enacted homeless camping ban, what helps, what hurts, and what we can all do to make a difference.

Greg's career has been devoted to helping others. He worked at the Joan Kroc Institute for Peace & Justice, supported guaranteed admission programs for first-generation college students at Cal State San Marcos, and now assists the most vulnerable as the CEO of Interfaith Community Services. In recent years Interfaith opened the first year-round homelessness shelter in North County for all genders, created a recuperative-care center for people discharging from hospitals without housing, launched a comprehensive detox, residential, and outpatient treatment center, and successfully completed campaigns to end and prevent homelessness for 1,000 people in 2018 and 2,019 people by the end of 2019.

In 2020 Greg led the purchase and conversion of a formerly blighted Escondido motel into a place of healing and restoration for persons overcoming health challenges and homelessness, while leading Interfaith's response to address both systemic racism and the disproportionately negative impact COVID has wrought on 21,000+ low-income neighbors Interfaith empowered last year.
