

HOW TO DISCOVER YOUR INNER POWER: INTERVIEW WITH AUSCHWITZ SURVIVOR DR EDITH EGER

A native of Hungary, Edith Eva Eger was just 16 years old in 1944 when she experienced one of the worst evils the human race has ever known. As a Jew living in Nazi-occupied Eastern Europe, she and her family were sent to Auschwitz, the heinous death camp. Her parents lost their lives there. She and her sister survived even though they were subjected to horrible treatment by Dr. Josef Mengele and survived the Death March in Austria. In 1949 she and her young family moved to the United States. In 1969 she received her degree in Psychology from the University of Texas, El Paso. She then pursued her doctoral internship at the William Beaumont Army Medical Center at Fort Bliss, Texas. She has spent much of her professional time working with members of the military helping them to recover from, and cope with, the ongoing effects of PTSD. Dr. Eger has always found ways to use her personal experiences to inspire, educate and help others.

Dr. Eger has a clinical practice in La Jolla, California where she uses her past as a powerful analogy to inspire people to reach their potential and shape their destinies. In the fall of 2017 at the age of 90, her memoir The Choice, Embrace the Possible was published. In her book, she details how the synergy of working with, and learning from, her patient's perspectives has enriched her life experiences and outlook. The book focuses on moving forward in-light-of hardship, has received excellent reviews, was a New York Times Bestseller, and is Internationally acclaimed. The New York Times Book Review wrote: "Eger's book is a triumph and should be read by all who care about both their inner freedom and the future of humanity." Oprah said of the book "I will be forever changed by Edith Eger's story." As of March 2018, the book has received two book awards, one being from the national organization of the Jewish Book Council; the other, The Christopher Award. Her second book, The Gift, Twelve Lessons to Save your Life was released in September 2020 and immediately became a best seller in the UK and Ireland. In this book she gives actionable advice to assist every person facing life's difficulties in a positive and healthy manner. Both books are being translated into more than thirty languages.

DENNIS BUCKO


Carroll Dennis Bucko was born December 19th, 1941, in West Springfield, Massachusetts and was educated in the public-school system. In high school Dennis was Class President and participated in soccer, track and the marching band and played trumpet in a Dixieland band. Dennis received his B.A.in Chemistry from American International College and his M.D. degree in 1967 from the University of Vermont. Dennis also met and married Sally Clerkin while he was a medical student in Burlington and they have three children (Dan, Wendy and Sarah) and seven grandchildren.

After a year at Rhode Island Hospital/Brown University as an intern in Surgery, Dennis served as a Lieutenant Commander in the Public Health Service stationed in Alaska for two very cold but exciting and rewarding years. After a four-year General Surgery residency at the University of Utah, and a two-year Plastic Surgery residency at the University of Michigan, he was Board Certified in Plastic Surgery in 1977 and stayed on at the University of Michigan for five years as Assistant Professor of Plastic Surgery while maintaining a part-time private practice with the chairman of the U of M Section of Plastic Surgery.

In 1981 the Bucko family moved from the "rust belt" to the "sun belt" in La Jolla. Dennis started his own private plastic surgery practice, after spending three years at Scripps Clinic developing their satellite plastic surgery program. Dr. Bucko is a retired clinical Assistant Professor of Plastic Surgery at UCSD. He has also volunteered on cleft palate teams in the United States and Mexico, as the leader of Southwest Medical Teams program in Oaxaca, Mexico in 1992, and as a surgeon and Board Member on the Rotary connected Mercy Outreach Surgical Teams trips to Mexico for over twenty years.

Dennis joined LJGT Rotary in 1987 and has been a long-time member and past Chairman of the International Service Committee and served on the LJGT Rotary Board in 1997 - 1998.

In his leisure time, Dennis, (AKA, Dr Harp) especially enjoys playing guitar and harmonica (especially blues style) in the California Cogs Band. He also enjoys kayaking, sailing and scuba diving.



Dennis has also become more and more serious over the years as a sculptor apprentice with the late A. Wasil, and he has displayed a bronze piece in the La Jolla Contemporary Art Gallery. His most recent work-in-progress is a commission of the "Virgin of Guadalupe", in one half scale, (3 feet) to be placed in the Mercy Hospital Clinic lobby when completed.

Dennis retired from practice last year and he and Sally have enjoyed travelling in their new Motor Home over the past year.
